Joseph M. Stewart, 78, passed away Friday, March 3, at the Prineville Memorial hospital after a month's illness.

Services were held Sunday, March 5, at the First Baptist church of Fossil. Mr. Stewart was interred at the Fossil L.O.O.F. cemetery. Officiating ministers were Rev. Bene Barrow of Prineville and Rev. Doty of Fossil.

Mr. Stewart was born in Shoups, Tenn., on Jan. 12, 1883. He came to Oregon in 1901, and returned to Tennessee in 1909 to marry Emmor Brookshire. The couple made their home on a ranch near Kimberly on the John Day river for 35 years.

After moving to Fossil in 1945, Mr. Stewart served as custodian of the Wheeler county courthouse. He was a member of the Christian church.

His survivors include his wife, Sarah Emmor Stewart; a daughter, Mrs. Gerald Morris of Fossil; and a son, Joe H. Stewart of Halfway. Other survivors are four brothers, three grandchildren, and several nieces and nephews.
