4-H Members Go On Tour Saturday

The Hoof and Horn 4-H livestock club members were taken on an educational tour through the P.G.G. Feedville Plant and Federated, Inc., both near Hermiston and on to Van Scholack lambing camp in Juniper Canyon on Saturday.

The Feedville plant manager took the members through the plant and explained the mixing procedures of the many grain products which are manufactured there. Also they make alfalfa hay pellets which the youngsters viewed as the baled hay was chopped, pressed into pellets, dried and then stored in large bins.

The group then traveled to Federated, Inc. where hogs and turkeys are raised and fattened for the market. They buy steers and fatten them for market sale. The farm manager explained the feeding program that they use and the different weights or grades the animals must reach before they are sold.

After a sack lunch at noon the tour ended at the Van Scholack lambing camp. Bob Scholack talked to the youngsters about the sheep, separating the new lambs and ewes into small inside pens for about 24 hours, then placing them outside in larger pens with other ewes and lambs. He stated they were three-fourths through lambing the 1,000 ewes and so far had quite a number of twins.

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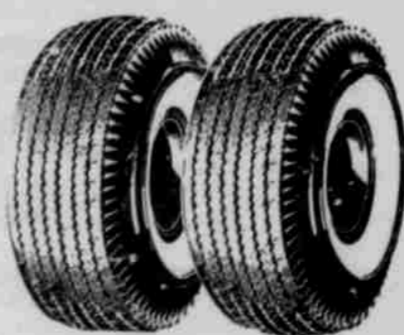
