### Assistance Available For Tax Returns March 24

Assistance in preparing Oregon state income tax returns will be given by State Tax Commission personnel at the Courthouse in Heppner between 2 p.m. and 4 p.m. on March 24.

Taxpayers wishing help in filing their returns are asked to bring earnings slips and other information needed to determine the correct tax, including, if possible, a copy of their federal return filed for the year 1960.

The Tax Commission points out that in order to be eligible for a refund a taxpayer must file a return. Refunds are issued on a "first come, first served" basis. It is also emphasized that if a joint return is filed, both spouses must sign it.

Deadline for filing is April 17 this year, since the 15th comes on Saturday.
