Wheat Loan Deadline March 31

March 31 is the last day warehouse stored wheat loans may be redeemed, according to the ASC office.

Commodity Credit grain loans are designed to allow producers to shop for a better price than they might receive at harvest time when money from their crops is needed. Any time during the loan period (from harvest to maturity date) they may be redeemed.

Using the loan program in this manner is the way it was designed to be used. Grain should not be delivered to Commodity Credit Corporation in satisfaction for the loan if it can be redeemed and the producer is able to break even.

Redemption of farm stored wheat loans may be made up to the final date for delivery shown on the delivery instructions.

Barley and rye loans mature on April 30. Corn matures on July 31.

Every producer having grain under Commodity Credit Corporation loan should make every effort to use the program as it was intended, says the ASC office.

Daughter of Pioneer Family Dies at Age 81

Services were held Monday at Creswick Mortuary for Oille M. Neill, 81, who died in La Grande, March 16.

Mrs. Neill was born in Athena and was a long-time Heppner resident, moving to La Grande 17 years ago following the death of her husband, Ed.

She was the last member of the family of one of the earliest settlers in the county. Her parents, Jake and Mary Wattenburger, came to Buttercreek from Missouri over the old Oregon Trail, settled there and farmed.

She was a member of the First Christian church.

She is survived by three daughters, all school teachers. Neva Neill lives in La Grande, where she teaches at Eastern Oregon College; Oleta Akers is at Milton-Freewater, and Lena Hermann is also at La Grande; six grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

Interment was in the Heppner Masonic cemetery.
