

Ione Teachers Explain College Qualifications

At the regular monthly meeting of the Ione P.T.A. last week the program was presented by Dallas Shockley and Chuck Hudson. The topic was "From Ione High to Where?"

Questions were asked of the graduation classes of '58, '59, '60 and the results given through discussion and a chart which had been compiled. This chart showed the number of graduates that have married, those attending colleges, business or vocational schools and those working and those in the service. Out of 15 graduates of the class of '60, 11 of them went to college. The overall U.S. figure is considerably smaller.

Shockley went on to discuss the figures and material to show what a student needs to be able to graduate now, and requirements to enter college in Oregon. At the present time the State of Oregon system of higher education requires a C or 2 average. Shockley explained tests required and many other points of interest to the students and the parents.

In the office at the high school can be found literature from

schools all over the state telling the entrance requirements, costs, facilities, and just any subject the parent or child will be interested in when deciding whether the college he chooses is the best to suit his needs and qualifications. There are 68 schools in Oregon that are vocational training schools in which art, flight training, nursing, modeling, barbering, beautician, and other kinds of vocational training may be acquired.

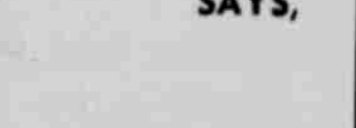
