

**Bank Of E.O.  
Rates High**

According to Clinton B. Axford, Editor, American Banker, the Bank of Eastern Oregon in Arlington, reported deposits of \$4,022,202 on December 31st. It gained 220 places in its standing among the 6100 largest commercial banks in the United States during 1960 and now ranks as 6016 largest in size compared with 6236 place at the end of 1959. Deposits of the bank totaled \$3,741,281 a year ago.

This is revealed in the 1961 annual roll call of the 6100 largest banks in the United States published by the daily American Banker of New York, the trade newspaper of the banking business.

There are 13,400 banks in the United States.

**HEPPNER'S MUSTANGS WIN FIRST ANNUAL ARLINGTON TRACK MEET**

Cosch Dick Haworth's Heppner High cindermen took top honors in the First Annual Arlington Track Meet last Friday. The Mustang squad scored a total of 48 points while Condon had 47 and Cascade Locks got 46 1-3. There were nine schools from Eastern Oregon competing in the meet with all scoring.

Last week in the Willow Creek meet at Heppner the Mustangs fell victims to both Condon and Arlington but came back with a surprising victory at Arlington.

The Mustang boys racked up five first places while Condon was close behind with four. Heppner also dominated the second place awards as they got four and the Blue Devils from

Condon were again right behind with three.

This was the first year of the meet so all of the times, distances and heights go down as records.

Heppner high junior Eddie Howard came up with a surprising victory in the century with a time of 10.6. Last week Howard placed third to Vaughn and Harbison of Condon with a time close to 11.0.

One of the main events of the meet was the javelin. Miller of Cascade Locks threw the javelin 384'7". This record will probably stay around for many years.

If the Horsemen's cinder squad can manage to hold onto the trophy for two more years they will be able to keep it. Heppner's chances for next year are very bright with only two seniors on the squad this year but the following year will be the one to look for.

**April 18 Marked Opening Day For Park Season**

Oregon's park season began on April 18 when eight state parks with overnight camping facilities were opened to the touring public, Mark H. Astrup, state park superintendent, announced this week. The opening of the park camping areas is to coincide with the opening of trout season, and the eight parks are located adjacent to fishing areas.

Thirty more state parks will open overnight camping facilities on May 24, to signal the general opening of camping season unless weather conditions force a postponement. Generally all state parks are open to the public for the day use throughout the year where weather conditions permit. Four parks, Beverly Beach, Cape Lookout, Harris Beach, and Jesse M. Honeyman on the coast were kept open for overnight camping throughout the winter.

The eight parks opening overnight camping facilities April 18 include Collier, Detroit Lake, Fort Stevens, Ochoco Lake, Owyhee Lake, Susan Creek, Cove Palisades and Tumalo state parks.
