Heppner High Mustangs' diamond squad split a two game series with the Stanfield Tigers last week.

Friday night on the Stanfield diamond Heppner became the victims of pitcher Jerry Voss as he led his team to a 1-0 victory. Voss allowed only two hits, walked seven and struck out 12 of the Heppner boys. Tuesday afternoon on the home diamond Heppner turned around and walked the Tigers 9-1. Tom Green was credited with the victory as he went the distance. Heppner got seven hits and three walks off Kip Clark.

Friday night Green allowed two hits, walked six and struck out eight.

Stanfield got its only run in the third inning as Woods came across on a walk that sent Banker to first with the bases loaded. Heppner never got in scoring position but did manage to get three men on second base.

Tuesday afternoon Heppner came back after their defeat to wallop the Stanfield team.

Heppner scored two runs in the first inning and in the second they tallied four more. Shan Applegate, Tom Glass, Dick Springer and Larry Green each scored in the big inning.

In the third inning Heppner got two more runs and in the fourth they tallied their final run.

Heppner will play at Umatilla next Tuesday in a doubleheader.

**Becky Fulleton, Neil Beamer Place At Shows**

Eight-year-old Becky Fulleton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Rolce Fulleton, is making a name for herself in horse competition, having placed two consecutive Sundays at the Mustang Spring Show in Pendleton. In the first go-around, April 9, she won first place in the stake race, last Sunday, she placed second. Becky rides her father's quarterhorse, Smokey Joe.

Becky, who was just eight the 7th of this month, has been riding "ever since she could sit in a saddle," according to her mother. Last year was the first time she entered official competition and she won two races at the Morrow County Rodeo. She also received third place in her age group (including up to 12 years of age) for the most points won in events over the year at the annual Play Day sponsored by the Heppner Wranglers. All members of Becky's family ride; she has two sisters who have won many prizes and her father is well known in horse competition throughout the area.

Neil Beamer, Heppner, is another winner at the Spring Show to whom winning is not new. Last Sunday he won the bulldogging event and placed second in the professional calf-roping. April 9 he won second in bulldogging and split third and fourth place in calf roping. In 1960 he placed champion in the Northwest Rodeo Association calf roping, was runner up in bulldogging and in the all-around for the year's events.

Mrs. J. O. Hager, Heppner, has received word of the death in Portland April 10 of Bess Stone, 74. Services and burial were at Baker, April 13.

Mrs. Stone and her husband Bert came to Heppner in 1910 and lived here until the early 1930's. He was employed as a saddle and harness maker by the Gene Noble Harness and Saddle Shop. They moved to Pendleton, then lived at Stanfield a number of years, before moving to Haines, where he died in 1952.

Mrs. Stone was born in Baker, June 8, 1887. The couple had no children.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Stone were well-known in the area and she visited here often after moving from Heppner.

**Early Anglers To Get Catch**

Prospects for fishing in Morrow and Umatilla counties are excellent, Dave Heckerth, district fishery agent, told members of Heppner-Morrow County Chamber of Commerce Monday noon.

Heckerth is with the Oregon State Game Commission, stationed at Pendleton. He reported that water conditions were exceptionally good for stocking of fish in the area this year due to low snow pack in the mountains. Normally early stock of the creeks, making early season fishing poor. This year the water is not riled, flooding due to snow run-off is below normal, and fishing conditions should be good from the beginning of the season.

Willow creek received 1,000 fish, Rhea creek 1,000, and the Cutsforth Park pond 1,000 yesterday. The fish planted are between eight and one-half and nine inches long.

The McKay reservoir has just been completely cleaned of trash fish, the water has had a rest so that food production has built up, it has been re-stocked, and fishing there should be excellent. Some 680,000 fish were released there last year for fishing this season; 100,000 fingerlings have been released this year with 200,000 more to be planted later in the season.

Though plans for Bull Prairie Lake are not completed, it is anticipated that a mixed stock will be planted there, with Rainbow trout and Eastern Brook trout making up the population. If carried out this will provide the only area where Eastern Brook trout are planted in the Heppner vicinity.

A State Game Commission film outlining the work carried on in providing fish for anglers was shown by Game Warden Glen Ward.

Ward said that 157,000 deer were killed in Oregon last year, 11,000 more than ever before. At 10,800 the elk kill was also at an all-time high. The trend in deer population shows a "real good population came through the winter," Ward said and stated that hunting conditions should be good next fall.

Oregon has been either first or second in the nation in deer killed since 1953, Ward said.

The pheasant population is also good in the county, and hunters should have good game bags during that season.
