For a going away costume the bride chose a blue silk sheath dress with matching jacket and white accessories. She wore her white orchid from her bridal bouquet.

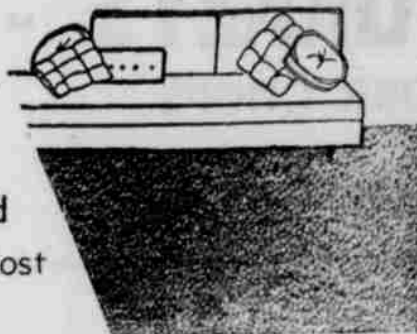
After a wedding trip to Canada the young couple will be at home at 3551 S. E. 66 St. in Portland.

What is there about rocks that makes people want to study them, to collect them?

Well, some rocks have great commercial value, some have a beauty that exceeds their commercial value, some combine both of these features, and still others may have no apparent value or beauty, but have an interesting form or composition. Add to these things the joy of actually finding a lovely crystal, or discovering an interesting vein of minerals in the side of a hill, or digging deep into the ground and uncovering one of those famous Oregon Thunder Eggs (a fire opal—you hope!), or an agate with minerals that give the appearance of imbedded plume or moss, and you have a "backpack" full of reasons.

Though our reasons for studying and collecting rocks may be varied, yet our common interest in this realm of nature draws us together for an evening each month to share our knowledge and love of this fascinating and limitless subject.

Last Saturday evening, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Clem and daughter of Walla Walla met with us. As Mr. Clem, associate professor of geology at Whitman College, told us of the geology of the Rocky Mountains, he showed us many beautiful colored slides of Glacier National Park, the Bitterroot Range, Yellowstone National Park, the majestic Tetons, and the results of the earthquake two years ago at Hebgen Dam.

How interesting to learn that many of the barren ridges in those mountains were of limestone. Due to the arid climate, the limestone doesn't dissolve as rapidly as surrounding elements; but in the east where there is more moisture, the limestone dissolves more rapidly to form the valleys. And so another phase of rock study—geology—has been brought to us at our meetings.
