New Long Distance Setup May 6

Telephone customers in Heppner, Cecil, Ione and Lexington will hear new operator voices when placing long distance calls after this Saturday (May 6). After 11 p. m. that night, operator assistance on calls will be provided from Pendleton rather than Arlington.

This is the second real change in the project to bring dial phone service to Arlington customers on May 20. The first change occurred when Condon, Fossil and Kinzua customers were cut over to Pendleton for operator service on April 15.

Work is well past the three-quarter point of the \$305,000 job. Installers have replaced manual telephones with dial equipped sets in most Arlington homes and businesses.

Western Electric specialists have about 90 percent of their work in the new Arlington central office building completed.

Some 20 tons of switches, relays and circuits there have been pieced together and testing is in progress.

At 11 p. m. Saturday, May 20, Arlington switchboard operators will pull down the last call on manual service which has been working there continuously since August 1, 1895.

Tom Green, Heppner pitcher, got in a jam in the final part of the inning with two men away and bases loaded. The third out came on a ground ball to shortstop Larry Green who threw out the runner at first base.

The second inning saw the diamond squad again go three up and three down, as did the Blue Devils.
