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Rep. Weatherford Seeks Federal Funds For Area

Representative Frank M. Weatherford said today that he is setting up a program for the enactment of funds from the Federal Impact Area Funds, which, he understands, are available for impact areas such as federally built dams, and other federal installations, and which, he believes should be made available to the Boardman Space Age area when the influx of people will become greater as the Boeing operations enlarge.

According to reports, Senator Wayne Morse, has been instrumental in other Oregon areas having Federal installations to receive this kind of money, and Representative Weatherford has written to him, and also Senator Maurine Neuberger, and Representatives Al Ullman and Edith Green so that Morrow County, and vicinity, will be in a position to receive this money at the time of need.

City Provides Special Pickup Service For Cleanup Days

Victor Groshens, superintendent of the city crew, has announced that refuse pickup through the Cleanup-Paintup month of May will be done by the city, as an additional service to the public.

Special pickup days will be May 15 and May 22 on a "first call, first served" basis. To arrange for this service the householder may call the city hall and leave the address of where the load is to be picked up.

All refuse should be left at the curbing, in a neat stack, so that it can be loaded onto city trucks from the street. If large amounts it should be sorted for burnable and non-burnable piles.

Airport Improvement Included In Long-Range Planning

Runways and apron for the Lexington airport are included in the five-year program by the Federal Aviation Agency, according to Congressman Al Ullman, D-Ore. The same program calls for a new airport at Condon.

The "National Airport Plan" proposed for the five-year period will be from 1962-66 for construction. It also calls for improvements at airports serving 12 other communities in Oregon's Second Congressional District.

The proposal for the new airport at Condon calls for a 3,000-foot runway, intended to be adequate for the basing of an estimated 15 aircraft at the location by 1966.

Also on the recommended list are new runways, taxiways and lighting at the Pendleton airport.

1961 Boat Licenses Should Be Obtained

Sheriff C. J. D. Bauman has reported that less than 50 percent of the owners of boats registered last year have renewed licenses for 1961.

Bauman pointed out that all small boats must be licensed and that owners should not wait until they wish to use the boats to apply.

Licenses are obtained through the State Marine Board. The application for the 1961 license was mailed to the owners last year and is on the reverse side of their 1960 registrations. Those who have misplaced or lost this form may apply to the State Marine Board by letter, enclosing the fee.

Fees for boats less than 16 feet are \$3.00; 16 feet and over but less than 20 feet are \$5.00; 20 feet and longer, \$5.00 for the first 20 feet plus \$1.00 per foot or part of a foot over 20 feet.

AGREEMENT REACHED FOR ADDITIONAL LAND AT BOARDMAN SITE

The State Department of Planning and Development announced today an agreement had been reached with the land owners whose land will be needed west of the Boardman range "to put together the package necessary for Boeing Company use."

No purchase of land south of the range is anticipated. The necessary buffer zone will be included in the range proper.

Governor Hatfield had earlier announced the plan of dividing the range down the middle, leaving the west half for Boeing and allowing the Navy to remain on the east portion. It is understood that options are now being taken for land necessary on the Navy's use east of the range.

School Board Budget Publicity Now Restricted

"It is now up to the public to inform themselves on school budget affairs." So stated a member of Morrow county school board Monday night when commenting on the failure to pass of House Bill 1550 which would have allowed school districts to use public funds for spreading information on budget and bond elections.

School board members were of the opinion that passage of this bill would have made it easier to explain the budgeted items to members of the public. The board is now restricted to the official publication of the budget and to one public hearing.

This makes it possible for many members of the voting public to respond to rumors instead of learning the true facts about the necessity for various items in the budget if they do not find it possible to attend the public hearings and get the facts, board personnel stated.

Beneficial Rain General Over County

A heavy rain which fell generally over the county Tuesday night has greatly increased prospects for a good crop, according to Al Lamb, Morrow County Grain Growers manager, and N. C. Anderson, county agent. Most of the county has deep soil which will absorb and carry over the moisture until the crops mature, Lamb said.

Anderson reported that .99 of an inch of rain fell on the Kenneth Smouse farm north of Ione in the period of Tuesday afternoon and night.

The U. S. Forest Service office reported that rain had created bad conditions in the forests. Though no lightning fires have been reported all side roads are becoming impassable. Work of planting young trees has been slowed up and fishermen were warned they should not attempt to drive off surfaced roads.

C. A. Ruggles reports that a heavy hailstorm damaged several hundred acres of wheat and barley on Mrs. Harry Duvall's ranch about five miles northeast of Heppner at noon yesterday. He said the hail was so heavy on the road that he was forced to put his jeep in 4-wheel drive to get through.

Chamber Discusses Communism Film

International affairs were discussed at Heppner-Morrow County Chamber of Commerce Monday following the showing of the past two weeks of the film "Communism on the Map."

Don Turner presided at the discussion which covered the value of foreign aid, the slow-ups and strikes at Cape Canaveral, the money expended in Laos, the Cuban situation, and many other aspects of the present condition of world affairs.

"We cannot purchase friendship for our country." "We are in a struggle for men's minds." "We should be selling democracy." These and other statements indicated that those present were not confident that there is no room for improvement in American foreign policy today.

A fairly unanimous opinion of the film showed a need of the American public awakening to what is actually happening in the world was expressed.

Turner said that Glen Green, an associate producer of the film, was now known to be a member of the John Birch Society. Most of those present seemed to agree, however, that the facts shown were ones the public should know.

The possibility of showing the film at Heppner High School was brought up and Robert Van Houte indicated he would discuss the matter with the school board, provided time could be made available before the end of the school term.

SCHOOL BOARD HOLDS MEETING; IONE CONSTRUCTION DEPENDENT UPON PASSAGE OF BUDGET MAY 19

Additional construction in the county school district was discussed at the board meeting Monday night. A tentative date of July 6 was set for opening bids for construction at Ione. A member of the architectural firm of Hayslip & Tuft is scheduled to show the final plans of the additional rooms, library and office to the Ione building committee and board members at a meeting June 16.

Construction of this project cannot be started until passage of the budget, which will be voted on May 19. Attorney for the school board stated that although the \$130,000 construction cost would be provided through funds from the second year of the special serial levy, it would be necessary to borrow money until those funds were available but money cannot be borrowed unless funds for interest have been budgeted.

Purchase of two 48-passenger buses will be made if the budget passes. June 12 was tentatively set for the opening of bids. One of these is a replacement bus for one worn out, another is for an additional bus considered necessary.

A request to the city council of Boardman was made by the board to set aside a tract of not less than 20 acres in the new townsite of Boardman for school site. This formal request was in

response to Boardman city council wanting to know if this would be satisfactory with the board. No definite location was specified.

Election of a school advisory committee member to a three-year term in the Boardman zone will be held in conjunction with the regular budget vote May 19, the board said. This was made necessary because it was not held at the May 1 school election vote. Earl McQuaw is running for the vacancy created by the resignation of Bob Seward, who was just elected to the district school board.

Morrow county school district investment is insured for over one and one-half million dollars, based on assessed valuation of all school property, members of the board were told by Howard Bryant, representing Turner, Van Marter & Bryant, insurance agents. The board last year changed the insurance of all the school districts in the newly consolidated district to insurance by an "agent organization." Under this plan those insurance agents who carried insurance on the old district's property still have a share in the total insurance, but the policies are cut in number and will become payable on premiums at a better synchronized date.

Bryant reported that the 64 different policies turned in by all

the original districts had now been cut in number creating a sizeable savings to taxpayers. Of 54 fire policies the number has been reduced to 34. These have been consolidated with two companies, making a further saving. All liabilities in the district are in one policy. Bonds are now in two different bonding companies; all boiler liabilities are in one policy.

Bryant commended the district on the fire rate allowed by the insurance companies. He said the rate of \$3.07 per thousand was very low for this type of insurance and "speaks well for the housekeeping and facilities of the district."

A bill presented by the county court for \$540 for bulldozing the new road into the school site was discussed. Attorney for the board reported that ownership of this road had still not been determined. There is a possibility that it is a county road, and as such should be kept up by the county. Board members voted to pay \$180 of this amount which was for gravel used on other school roads but to hold the balance until ownership of the Morgan street extension road could be determined.

Robert Van Houte, administrator, reported that building at the Heppner-Lexington high school site was ahead of schedule with floor beams and joists and wall skeleton going up this week.

Umatilla Ordnance Depot To Hold Open House

Commanding Officer Colonel Cam Longley, Jr., has announced that Armed Forces Day 1961 will be observed with an "Open House" at Umatilla Ordnance Depot on Saturday, May 20, between the hours of 9 a. m. and 4 p. m.

During the day visitors to the depot will be able to inspect military equipment and supplies, including guided missiles and conventional ammunition. Construction and combat vehicles will be on display, and tours will be conducted to the more remote parts of the 16,000 acre establishment.
