Morrow County Homemaker Festival Scheduled for May 16 at Boardman

Homemakers, representing the eight extension units in Morrow county, will gather for their annual Homemaker Festival at the Boardman Grange hall on May 16 to climax a year's study of projects in family living sponsored by the OSU extension division, according to Esther Kirmis, Morrow county extension agent.

The Five F's of Fashion, the theme of the celebration, will feature Miss Hildegard Struefert, OSU extension clothing specialist of Corvallis, as speaker and over 30 women who have participated in the Dressmaking I and II workshops held in the county the past year.

"This will be a luncheon-type festival," states Miss Kirmis. "Registration will begin at 11 a.m. with women sitting down to a noon luncheon and remaining at the table for the remainder of the program."

Boardman and Irrigon units, hostesses for this event, are in charge of the registration and decoration of the Grange hall. The Boardman Grange women are serving the luncheon and women from the community church will furnish child care for 50 cents a child and 25 cents for each additional child in the family. Mothers are asked to furnish their children with sack lunches; milk will be furnished. Each unit is exhibiting one

of the past year's home economics projects.

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LILIAN C. TURNER FOUNDATION'S HISTORY REVIEWED PRIOR TO MEETING

In the year of 1901 at the graduation of the Heppner High School there was one young lady, Lillian Cockran, who had as her deepest desire and ambition to become a teacher. Not just a teacher, but a successful one with the thought for the pupil always uppermost in mind.

She had been doing some substitute teaching under her high school principal, Professor Reid, so immediately after graduation in 1901 she went to Grant county to begin her teaching career, returning to Heppner as a seventh and eighth grade teacher in 1906. In 1909 on Christmas Day she was united in marriage with Frank Turner of that city. She continued her teaching for quite a number of years with only time out when her children were small.

In the year 1925 Mrs. Turner started teaching in the seventh and eighth grades at Lexington where she taught until 1935 at which time she taught for one year in Hardman, returning the next year to Lexington, where she remained thruout 1944.

During all the years of her teaching she realized the importance of a higher education for the high school graduates, and upon her death in 1947 after an illness of several years, she left an endowment to be used in some way to help further this realization.

In the year 1949 a group of her former students met at the Lexington I.O.O.F. hall on May 14 and formed what is known as the Lillian C. Turner Foundation. At this meeting under the chairmanship of the late George Peck,

the by-laws were made and accepted. These state that the association shall have custody of the funds left it by Lillian C. Turner and added to by every means possible. This money is to be loaned by a majority vote of the Board of Directors to high school graduates of the Lexington community or high school graduates who are children of students of Lillian C. Turner.

The annual meeting shall be the Saturday in May before Mother's Day. The dues shall be two dollars per person and the money added to the loan fund.

Money shall be loaned on a two-year term only, bearing 3 per cent annual interest. These notes shall be renewed by a majority vote of the board of directors. Persons in the armed forces have the same privileges except those who make the service a career. Persons under age must have a co-signer.

At the meeting of 1951 there were at this time 162 members to this worthwhile organization. Since then dues have been collected yearly, and a smorgasbord has been given at different times, with the money used to further the cause.

There have been three loans made to high school graduates. At present the Board of Directors are Bill VanWinkle, chairman, Gene Cutsforth, E. E. Peck, Mrs. Roy Martin, and Mrs. Edith Munkers, secretary, of Lexington, and Clayton Davis of Pendleton.

The meeting for this year will be on Saturday, May 13, at the Lexington I.O.O.F. hall at 6:30 p. m. The supper and business meeting will be followed by a dance at Lexington gym, starting at 10 o'clock.
