Coach Bob Cantonwine's Heppner High diamond squad split a doubleheader with the Lone Cardinals last Friday afternoon on the lone diamond. Lone blanked the Mustangs in the first game 6-0. In the second game Heppner came back to take the decision 6-5.

In the opening game Lone got one run in the first inning. Heppner got one hit in that inning but then was caught in a double play.

Lone's big inning came in the second when they tallied for four big runs. Wayne Hams, lone catcher, scored his second run of the day in the second. In the third inning Lone scored their last run of the game as Ken Klingner crossed the plate.

The big factor of the game was Lone's errorless game, while Heppner committed five errors.

Kenny Smith started on the mound for Heppner and LeRoy Gardner relieved him in the second inning. Swanson went all the way for the Cardinals and gave up only two base hits. He walked only two men and struck out seven.

In the second game Heppner came flying back to take the victory 6-5. Gardner was again on the mound for the Heppner team and in the fourth inning Smith came in to finish the game.

Heppner played a much tighter game as they had only two errors as did Lone.

Lone again opened up in the first inning and scored three runs while Heppner went hitless. In the second inning Lone went three up and three down. Heppner collected one run as Ladd Dick scored.

Heppner got its big action in the fourth inning as they tallied for five runs. Dick Springer opened the inning with a hard drive into right field for a triple. Shan Applegate got a free passage on balls and then Daryl Dick hit a sharp single. Bill Cox collected a single that drove in one run and then Larry Green came up to the dish and knocked a line drive to deep center field for a triple, driving in three more runs.

Lone tallied one run in the fourth inning and one more in the fifth.

Gardner led the Mustangs at the plate with two hits for five times up and Ken Klingner led the Cardinals with three hits for six times at the plate.

This was the closing game for the 1961 season with three seniors playing their last game—Bill Monagle, Larry Tibbles, and Tom Glass.

This "outer-space" age we live in seems to demand a speeded-up type of education. We have found that over the past few years the shortcourses or workshops have been the most effective way of Extension training and informing our people of the latest recommendations and developments.

During this past winter over 100 persons attended livestock and farm management shortcourses and close to 75 women took part in Dressmaking I and II workshops. Because of this enthusiastic reception we are now making plans for a wider variety and more effective shortcourses for the winter 1962. We would like to sponsor one shortcourse for husband and wife; and the agriculture branch would like to sponsor one of interest to farm management.

In order that this planning might start at once, we are asking you to check the interest survey blank and return it to the County Agent's office by June 1. The materials given in these courses would cover approximately four evenings in January or February of 1962. When we find in what direction your interest lies we will appoint a steering committee, made up of interested persons in the community to plan the details.

Heppner High cinder boys had a rather successful weekend in the sub-district track meet at Sherman High Saturday afternoon.

One school record fell as Eddie Howard ran the century in 10.3. The old record was held by Tom Driscoll, a 1960 graduate, who ran it in 10.5. Dan Brosnan approached the school mark in the 220 as he ran it in 24.2 and the record is 24.1.

Jim Steagall gathered in two first places as he ran the 220-yard low hurdles in 21.8 and took the pole vault at the height of 10 feet 6 inches.

Howard got second in the 100 with the new school record of 10.3.

Heppner's freshman miler, Lee Padberg, took the fourth place spot with a time of 4:58. Archie Ball racked up two second places. He placed in the 120 high hurdles with a time of 16.4 and tied for second in the high jump with a height of 5 feet 4 inches.

Bruce Moyer placed fourth in the discus with a toss of 111 feet 3 inches.

This week end the track team will again go to Sherman for the District 7-A2 meet. The boys who qualify in this meet will then go to Corvallis the next weekend for the state meet.
