PP&L Announces Program To Help Youth Find Careers

A program of helping high school sophomores and upper classmen to acquaint themselves with engineering career opportunities in industry was announced recently by Pacific Power & Light Company and Scientists of Tomorrow, a national organization for youth.

"Young people need more help in recognizing how they should prepare for useful engineering and management careers in industries that are becoming more and more dependent upon people with technical and scientific knowledge," D. R. McClung, president of Pacific Power, said in the announcement.
