was "The Five F's of Fashion," which are fiber, fabric, finish, function and family. She was also narrator during the modeling of about thirty dresses made by women in the county. Esther Kirmis, county extension agent, Heppner, announced the models as they appeared.

More than 100 persons attended the festival, which was a

luncheon-type affair. Registration was started at 11 a. m. with luncheon served at noon by the Home Economics Club of Greenfield grange. Members of the Boardman and Irrigon units were hostesses. During the registration hour, visitors viewed the displays of the year's projects. Each unit in the county was responsible for one exhibit as follows: "Food Labels Tell the Inside Story," Heppner unit; "Let's Have Lamb," Lena; "A Look At A Woman's World," Rhea Creek; "Better Kitchen Storage," Pine City; "Soaps and Detergents," Ione; "Understanding Boys and Girls," Irrigon; "Managing Your Money," Boardman; "Let's Broll Meat," Lexington.

Following luncheon the Riverside high school band entertained and Jim Miller, John Gollyhorn and Pat Partlow played an alto saxophone trio, accompanied by Miss Warner.

Mrs. Warren McCoy of Irrigon was master of ceremonies, and program chairman. Other members of the county committee were Mrs. Willard French, Echo; Mrs. Randall Martin, Heppner; Mrs. Paul Warren, Lexington; Mrs. John Bergstrom, Heppner; and Mrs. Earl Briggs, Boardman.

He stated there are about twice as many girl members as boys. A recent new project for boys is the Rifle Safety club.

Lorene Whittaker, Pilot Rock, spoke on District VII work. Mrs. Paul Warren, Heppner, publicity chairman, gave council comments. Closing remarks were by Mrs. Willard French, Echo, of the Pine City unit. Mrs. Jean Nelson, Lexington, led in group singing.
