1962 Acreage Allotments Same As For 1961

The 1962 national wheat acreage allotment of 55 million acres is the minimum fixed by law and is the same as for the 1961 crop. Legislation provides for establishing a national wheat acreage allotment each year except in the event of a national emergency. The supply formula used

to determine the national allotment indicates an acreage at the minimum level.

The county allotments will be apportioned among individual farms according to past acreage of wheat, tillable acres, crop rotation practices, type of soil, and topography.

Wheat producers will be informed of the acreage allotments for their farms in advance of a wheat quota referendum, according to the local ASC office.
