Highway Traffic Increased In April

April traffic over Oregon highways jumped 6.7 per cent over April of 1960, according to counts taken at 84 rural traffic recorders of the Oregon State Highway Department. Urban traffic past five counters indicated a 2.1 per cent increase for the same period.
Heavier traffic on U.S. 26, U.S. 30 west of Pendleton, U.S. 97, and U.S. 99 more than offset losses on U.S. 395 and the northern

On their visit to Bryce Canyon they went down 2,000 feet below the rim of the canyon and "shot" many beautiful views of the interesting formations that they saw while on the 4-mile hike below.
