The Oregon Wheatgrowers League is featuring a layer-type spice cake in their 1961 cake baking contest at state and county fairs in Oregon this year. This means that Morrow county women over 21, or married women will be eligible to whip up a layer-type spice cake, using either solid type shortening or cream, and enter it in the Morrow County Fair scheduled for August 22 — 25 at Heppner.

Mrs. E. M. Baker, member of the County Wheat Utilization Committee, has given me a list of the rules for this annual contest. I'd like to share them with you.

—Contestant must be a resident of Morrow county.

—Cake must be exhibited and judged at the Morrow County Fair — Heppner.

—Cake-baking contestants must be women over 21, or married women.
