416 County Residents Receive Social Security Checks

More than \$26,931 in monthly social security insurance benefits are received by 416 persons in Morrow county, announces Vernon A. Welo, manager of the La Grande district office.

This is an increase of about eight per cent over the same period a year ago.

Retired workers receiving this benefit in the county number 259. They receive \$19,158 monthly. There are five disabled workers receiving \$380.00. Sixty-six wives or husbands of retired or disabled workers receive \$2,556. Thirty-two widows receive \$1,881. Dependent parents, or mothers with child, number nine in the county and receive \$553.
