

Fire Committee Named to Study Rural Control

A newly-appointed committee to coordinate rural fire control in communities throughout the county met Saturday afternoon at the county agent's office to discuss a volunteer fire fighter's program.

The committee, appointed by the county court, consists of Andy Van Schoelack and Frank Anderson of Heppner; Orville W. Cutsforth, Lexington; Don McElligott and Ralph Crum, Ione.

They inspected several pieces of fire fighting equipment which the county court secured through war surplus outlets during the past year. Van Schoelack was named coordinator by the group and asked to contact the court for its cooperation in getting the equipment ready to fight fire at the earliest possible date. The apparatus will be strategically placed around the county, with volunteers listed to use it from those locations.

Equipment available for this use from the county is three jeeps, with 100-gallon tanks and fire fighter pumps; and a 6x6 army truck with 800-gallon tank and pump. The equipment will be used along with farmer-owned fire fighting equipment. Additional equipment which will be worked into the program is the Morrow County Grain Growers fire equipment and that owned by Inland Chemical and Bi-County Fertilizer Company.

The committee members will call community meetings within the next 10 days to get the suggestions of ranchers and farmers of the area and to form a working unit for responsibilities in getting equipment placed. An effective control program will also be organized. The volunteers will have an opportunity to locate the equipment where they feel it will be most widely used as well as listing equipment which they have to contribute in case of fire.

Heppner Fire Chief C. A. Ruggles and County Agent N. C. Anderson are assisting in coordinating the volunteer fire control program.
