The Braves took the deciding Little League baseball game from the Indians Tuesday with a 12-2 win to lead the league in the first half of play, and the Dodgers broke their seven game losing streak with a 17-13 win over the Giants on Monday.

A change in the schedule puts the Dodger-Indian makeup game in Ione Friday at 5:30 and the Braves-Indian game on June 22 in Ione at 5:30.

Last Thursday the Braves defeated the Dodgers 22-11. The Dodgers scored first with 8 runs and the Braves bounced right back with a 13-run scoring spree in the second. They went on to score in each frame and held the Dodgers to only three more runs. Steve Pettyjohn started on the mound for the Braves. Chris Labhart and Randy Stillman were used in relief. For the Dodgers it was Larry Richmond and Kit Anderson doing the pitching.

On Friday, the Giants beat the Dodgers in a see-saw battle, 10-8. The Giants got two runs in the first off of Bob Dobbs' double and from then on the lead changed hands until the Giants went ahead in the fifth with two runs and one in the sixth while holding the Dodgers scoreless in the last two frames.

Monday, the Dodgers got revenge when they tangled with the Giants again, this time coming out on top with a 17-13 win for their first win after seven losses. Each team had a heavy scoring inning, the Dodgers with seven runs in the first, the Giants eight runs in the second and the Giants picking up three more runs while the Dodgers tallied 11. Dennis O'Donnell and Gary Ball pitched for the Giants and for the Dodgers it was Larry Richmond and Mark Labhart.

The first half of the season ended Tuesday night, except for a makeup game Friday in Ione, with the Braves handing the Indians a 12-2 defeat. Jim Doherty pitched for the Braves, giving up

two runs on one hit in the sixth and helped his cause with two home runs for five RBIs. Jerry Stefani started for the Indians and was relieved by Gene Heller and Jeff Turner, giving up 12 runs on seven hits.

On June 1 the Braves lost a tight game to the Giants in a 4-2 battle.

The Braves got things going in the top of the first with two runs on two hits and held the Giants scoreless until the bottom of the third, when they scored three runs on one hit to go ahead and picked up an insurance run in the sixth for the 4-2 win. Jim Doherty went the distance for the losers, giving up four runs on two hits, and fanning 15 men. The winning pitcher, Gray, allowed 2 runs on four hits and striking out 8.

Friday the Dodgers moved to Ione for a game with the Indians, losing 24-8. For the first three innings, the Dodgers kept the Indians in check and were trailing by one run, when the Indians exploded in the fourth with 10 runs on three hits and picked up five more runs in the fifth while holding the Dodgers scoreless in the last two frames. Jeff Turner pitched for the winners. Mark Labhart and Larry Richmond for the Dodgers.

Monday, June 5, the Braves broke a 2-game losing streak in blanking the Giants 12-0. Chris Labhart giving up only one hit to O'Donnell of the Giants. Steve Pettyjohn and Jim Doherty relieved Labhart in the fourth. The first three frames were a tight pitching duel until the Braves tallied four runs in the fourth and eight in the fifth. Labhart helped his cause with three for three at the plate.

On Wednesday, the Indians continued their winning ways 12 to 2 over the Giants. The Indians scored in each frame and the Giants picked up one run in the fifth and sixth innings. Gary Ball pitched for the Giants and Heller for the Indians and was three for three at the plate. Jeff Turner hit a grand slam homer in the fifth and for the Giants, Bob Dobbs and Terry Prock each got a hit.

Oregon's first family now has a radiation fallout shelter in the basement of their home.

Installation of the shelter was completed Friday at the home of Gov. and Mrs. Mark O. Hatfield, Salem, as a public service project by members of the Unit Masonry Association of Oregon, a group of mason contractors, bricklayers and material dealers.

The governor has frequently expressed his concern at civil defense emphasis on evacuation of target areas. "In the virtual exclusion of programs of protection against radiation fallout."

The Oregon governor supported a proposal, passed by the recent Oregon state legislature, which provided limited tax exemptions for fallout shelter construction.
