4-H Club to Build Camp Council Ring

Plans to build a log council ring, which will become the spiritual center of the Morrow county 4-H camp have been made by the 4-H leaders council according to Joe Hay and Esther Kirmis, Morrow county extension agents. The 4-H camp is at Cutsforth's park in the Blue Mountains, 20 miles southeast of Heppner.

"It is felt that this council ring will not only serve 4-H youths, but other church and fraternal organizations as well," states Miss Kirmis.

Men 4-H leaders and parents are requested to come to Cutsforth Camp on Wednesday, June 28, 9:00 A. M., states Hay, in order that the council ring and several other needed improvements might be made in time for this year's camp, July 6-9.

Other scheduled improvements are to finish the inside of the kitchen with plywood and paint, construct a permanent flag pole and base which will be known as the Bernard Doherty memorial, put in drain pipes for outside sink, paint outside restrooms, and build a few tables.

Men are asked to bring such tools as hammers, squares, saws (hand, skill or chain) sledge hammer, splitting wedges, axes, paint brushes and can or spray gun, shovels, rakes, concrete equipment, wrenches, screwdrivers, etc.
