

Big Game Tags Now Ready for Hunters, Commission Says

Oregon hunters are advised by the game commission that big game tags and application forms for the 1961 big game hunt are now available at all license agents. Application forms for permit deer and elk hunts may be obtained with the purchase of elk or deer tags. Public drawings will be held on all permit hunts where the number of applicants exceeds the permit quotas.

Antelope hunters will file application on the form provided by the license agent and are reminded that fee of \$5.00 must be remitted with the application. This fee will be refunded to unsuccessful applicants.

The commission reminds elk hunters that any elk hunter who applies for an elk tag or permit in an area where no general elk season will be held, and is unsuccessful in the drawing, is eligible for a refund by presenting his elk tag to the game commission within 20 days following the drawing.

Closing dates for submitting applications and the drawing dates for big game tags and permits are as follows:

- Antelope—closing date, 5 p. m. July 18; drawing date, 10 a. m. July 25.
- Controlled deer hunt—closing date, 5 p. m. August 1; drawing date, 10 a. m., August 8.
- Permit deer—closing date, 5 p. m., August 8; drawing date, 10 a. m., August 15.
- Permit elk—closing date, 5 p. m., August 29; drawing date, 10 a. m., September 7.

To assist hunters in selecting hunting areas and in filling applications, all license agents have been supplied a summary sheet listing the 1961 big game seasons. This listing is available for perusal prior to the distribution of the big game regulations booklets. Copies of the regulations will be available to all hunters about the first of July.

Forest Service Boys Take Driving Tests

Retirement Benefits Extended For Many

New rules allow retired people to earn up to \$2,700 in 1961 and still receive some retirement benefits. Vernon A. Welo, manager of the La Grande district Social Security office, said today.

Welo said, "If a person earns between \$1,200 and \$1,500 during the year, one dollar of his benefit will be withheld for each two dollars of earnings over \$1,400. Earnings beyond \$1,500 in a year require a dollar for dollar reduction of the person's yearly benefit."

Retirement payments are paid for any month in which the person earns less than \$100, regardless of his total earnings during the year.

Persons who continue to work after retirement age should write or call at the Social Security office at 1108 J. Avel, La Grande and ask for free pamphlet No. 23a which explains the new rules.

TOPPING RECIPE GIVEN BY ESTHER KIRMIS

A creamy whipped topping for strawberry shortcake—with few calories than whipped cream and pennies less a serving— is suggested in a new recipe from Zelma Reigle, OSU food marketing specialist.

Here's the recipe. Add one-fourth cup of milk to a cup (½ pint) of heavy cream and whip. Add sugar and flavoring, if desired, or serve as plain "extended whipped cream."

More servings are possible from this combination than in equal amount of whipped cream. The blend holds its shape, its flavor, and less buttery than whipped heavy cream.

Miss Reigle suggests the topping for canned or frozen fruits, baked desserts or other recipes calling for a whipped topping.

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
