Dennis O'Donnell and Gary Ball shared pitching duties with Mark Labhart going for the Dodgers.

On Thursday, the Braves and Indians battled in the tie-breaking game, with the Braves coming out on top, 8-2, which

put them in first place. The Indians scored first with one run in the second and picked up another in the third. The Braves jumped ahead with four tallies in the third, picking up one in the fourth and three in the sixth. Jim Doherty was on the mound for the Braves and Jerry Stefani for the Indians. Only man getting two hits in the game was Dennis Carlson of the Braves, getting a pair of doubles.
