### Two IFYE Students To Visit Morrow

The Fredrick T. Martin and Keith Res families of June will each play host to two IFYE (International Farm Youth Exchange) students from Luxembourg and Venezuela this summer, according to the Morrow county agent's office.

Marie-Victoire Von Roengen of Luxembourg, 24, will spend the period of August 6 to August 26 with the Martins. She is Catholic and has completed seven years of primary and two years of secondary school. She has always lived on a farm and has had experience with gardening, fruit culture, and cooking. She can read and speak English.

The Res family will host Edgar Uzcategui, 20, from the University of Venezuela, between September 2 to September 23. Edgar is also Catholic and has completed secondary education. He has lived 18 years on a 1250 acre farm. Their major crops are coffee, sugar cane and small fruits. He can understand English when spoken slowly.

Each Morrow county family will soon receive a host family kit from the state 4-H club office, Corvallis, which will describe the IFYE's respective countries and give further information on their duties as an IFYE host family.

### Morse Requests Study Of Red Water Disease

A telegram from Sen. Wayne Morse to the Gazette-Times Saturday stated that he has requested the Department of Agriculture to take immediate steps to assist in solving the problem of red water cattle disease. He stated that Dr. Glen B. Van Ness, associated with the laboratory service section of animal disease eradication division at Ames, Iowa, will be in Oregon the latter part of the month to do field research on this disease. He will make thorough finding and recommendations to the Department.

A check with County Agent N. C. Anderson reveals that though there was a small outbreak of this disease in cattle about 12 years ago in the Boardman-Irrigon area, it has not been a problem here. Even at that time there was very little loss due to red water disease.

The disease strikes mainly in irrigated areas and is easily controlled with an effective, low cost vaccine, Anderson said.
