The only burn suffered on the fire was a burned hand while draining potatoes. Charles Dickey, Heppner, suffered the burn while cooking for fire fighters and was brought to Pioneer Memorial hospital for treatment, then released. Others injured were D. V. Matott, 34, La Grande, who had gashed his thumb while cutting slash, and John Stevenson, 19, Portland, who fell in sharp rock while running from a rolling log which was on fire. Both were brought to the hospital Monday, treated, and returned to the firelines.

All mills in the area were closed Monday and Tuesday, and help and equipment from as far away as Walla Walla was brought in. Big cats were trucked into the mountains and used in clearing the lines for back-firing.

Merchants Help
Merchants of Heppner did their part when they were called to open stores Saturday night and fill trucks with food for the firefighters. Restaurants of the town made sandwiches in the hundreds. When they ran out of food, stores opened for them and

though supplies ran low on some things before Monday deliveries, firefighters were well fed. The Forest Service reported that the cooperation of Heppner merchants had done much to make their task easier.

Not only food suppliers helped out, Mike Whitesmith opened the J. C. Penney store Monday night to supply fighters with clothing. Ed Gonty opened his Shoe Store Sunday, Pete McMurry of Heppner Auto Parts was called several times to supply mechanics with replacements for broken parts, and many others responded.

O'Keefe said Thursday morning that though the fire is now contained, men would be required on patrol the rest of the summer in the area. It will be some time before the total damage can be accurately reported, and some can never be evaluated. Although much timber was consumed, it was mainly in draws and inaccessible places which would not have been harvested in the foreseeable future, and the main fire was successfully kept from prime forest lands by hard working crews.

Illegal Actions Result in Fires

Setting off firecrackers and burning trash, both illegal, set two fires in Heppner this week, according to Fire Chief C. A. Ruggles.

Sunday afternoon at 1:45 volunteers were called to the hill one block west of the city swimming pool where fire had gotten away from a trash can. The wind blowing at the time carried the fire around the base of the hill, burning a strip about 30 feet wide and 150 feet long before firemen brought it under control.

The firecracker fire was started about 10:30 p. m. Tuesday morning when two small boys set off crackers in the bottom of a canyon near the highway north of town. Flames quickly spread in the wind over the hill. Spotted burned places covered about five to six acres before firefighters brought it under control one half hour later.

Fire Chief C. A. Ruggles again warned the public that burning trash is against the law at this time of year, even in a trash burner. He said citations would be issued to the offenders.

The boys were taken to the police station, warned, and released to their parents.

Sandra Harshman, senior at Heppner high school, had a thrilling experience as one of nine student delegates and two adults to represent Oregon at the Future Homemakers of America national meeting in St. Louis, Mo., July 3-7.

Sandra was driven by her mother, Mrs. Everett Harshman, to Pendleton July 1, where she was joined by representatives from La Grande and Milton-Freewater. From there the three girls went by private car to Portland where they met the six other delegates and the two adult representatives. Sunday morning they left Portland International Airport by plane for Kansas City, where they changed to a jet for the trip to St. Louis.

"It only took us 30 minutes from Kansas City to our destination," Sandra reports.

The Oregon delegates were registered at the Chase Park Plaza hotel in St. Louis.

One of the highlights Sandra reports is the election of Mary Virginia Speckhart, La Grande, as secretary of the national organization. Miss Speckhart is state president of the Oregon association.

The theme for the meeting was "Youth, Measure Your Values." Several prominent speakers ad-

ual panel discussions and buzz groups were organized. The purpose of the meeting was to gain an understanding of how and where the girls receive their values, and to determine what values are important to teen-agers.

The delegates took values tests, which were interpreted for them by Dr. Glenn R. Hawkes, head of the department of child development at Iowa State University. The delegates rated values as follows: 1 education, 2 family life, 3 pleasure, 4 efficiency, 5 concern for others, 6 economy, 7 health, 8 status, and 9 friendship. Dr. Hawkes said these ratings would not be typical for all teenagers, but showed a good interpretation for the chosen group, made up of leaders who have the improvement of honest family living as their stated goals.

The six general sessions were attended by 1150 delegates from the U. S., including Hawaii, Alaska, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands. The sessions were held July 3 through 6. Sandra reported the biggest event and most thrilling to her was the formal banquet at which the national president spoke on values.

The group left St. Louis July 7 by plane, changing at Kansas City and continuing to Portland, where Sandra took a plane to Pendleton. She was met there by her mother and father.

Sandra is the past president of the local chapter and new parliamentarian of the Future Homemakers of America, Oregon association. She had taken a lot of kidding as to how she would find it in the mid-West in the hot summer months. She reports that though the weather was as hot as she had been told it would be "and our feet kept swelling," it was a thrill she would never forget.
