

COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS

County Court met in regular session, July 5, 1961. The minutes of the June term were read and approved. 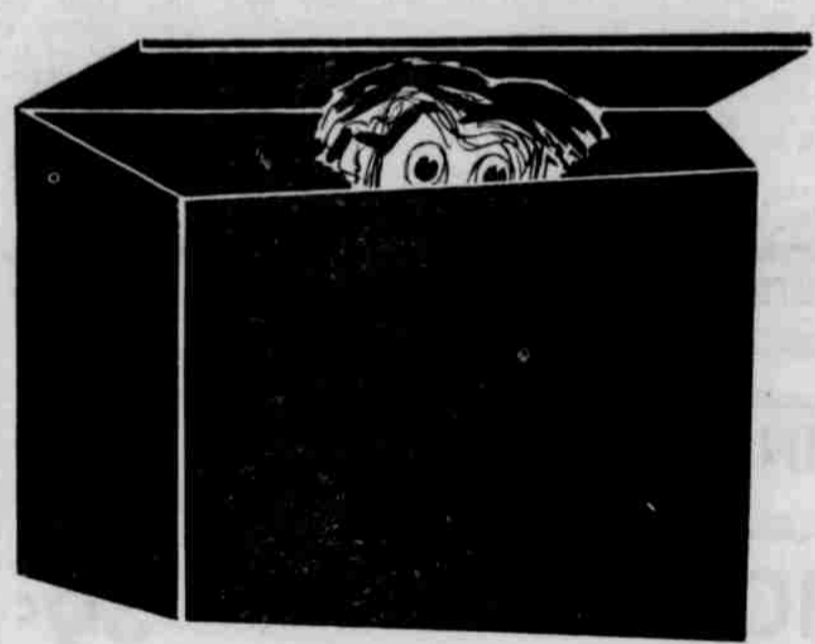

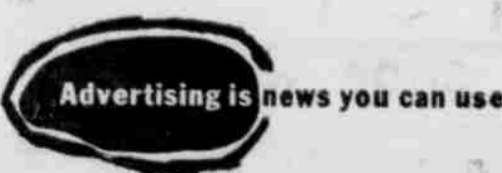
