Egg Contract Trucker To Serve Morrow

Morrow county egg producers will be served with a new contract trucker beginning August 17. Alvin S. Johnson, Eugene, a contract trucker engaged in hauling hatching eggs between Eugene and Newberg, and points in Western Oregon, was granted an increase in operating authority Tuesday by the state public utility commissioner.

Effective August 17, Johnson will be cleared to transport eggs between producers in Morrow, Umatilla, Gilliam, Sherman, Hood River, Wasco, Crook, Jefferson, Deschutes and Klamath counties, and processing plants in western Oregon.

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Portland Host City For Japan-American Meeting

Portland, Oregon will be host city for the Sixth Japan-American Conference of Mayors and Chamber of Commerce Presidents to be held Sept. 17-21.

The conference, which promotes mutual understanding and friendship through free discussion and studies of common problems, is of great importance to all areas of the Columbia Basin and the Inland Empire because of its bearing on the free flow of commerce between Japan and American port cities.

Representatives from Oregon, Washington, California, Idaho, Hawaii and Alaska, as well as 19 Japanese cities, have been invited to attend.

Held every two years since 1951, the conference met last in Osaka, Japan in 1959.

This will mark the first time that Portland has been host city and is recognition of the key role played by this major world seaport as distribution center for the vast Columbia Basin and Inland Empire.
