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Chilean Student Tells Soroptimists of Homeland

"Your beautiful Oregon is very much like my own homeland of Chile." This was one of the comparative remarks made by Miss Driba Redbie when she spoke to members of the Soroptimist club last Thursday noon at their luncheon meeting.

Many interesting comparisons were made of the geography, climate, home life, schools, culture and people of her native Santiago, Chile, with what she has learned of America the past few months since coming to Oregon for college training and in making her home this summer in Morrow county. She arrived in Oregon January 24 to attend the second semester of school at the University of Portland and this summer has worked on the ranch of the Donald McElligott family.

Speaking with fluent English, Miss Redbie instantly radiated a warm and friendly atmosphere and made her audience feel a desire to tour the coastline, fields, mountains and lakes of her South American homeland. Average necessities in living and the warm friendship of people are much the same in both countries, she remarked. But the luxuries of expensive cars, television, and equality of both men and women in attending colleges of their choice are some of the

privileges which Chileans do not have. Most traveling is done by bus, as an average car there costs about \$20,000. Few women are privileged to attend school beyond high school, as there are not enough schools and boys are given preference for advance training.

Miss Redbie has felt very honored to be accepted into the University of Portland as a business administration major. Her family, consisting of mother, retired father, two younger sisters and two younger brothers reside in Santiago. After completing her college training in Portland she will return to Chile where she hopes to hold a responsible business position. She finds farm life very enjoyable and is appreciative of her chance to live in the county this summer. One of her first purchases after coming here was a cowboy hat. She is looking forward to the fair and rodeo before returning to Portland.
