

New Menu Ideas Told For School Lunches

It's time for another tale from the "Saga of the Little Brown Sack." Translated from the original, it can be seen in many forms—as a color-bright, school-bound lunch carrier, a staunch and sturdy lunchbox that marks a hard-working man, or a secret compartment in that mystery purse or attached case that rides to the office on a crowded bus or expressway.

But they all contain one thing in common, or at least they should—a nutritious and appetizing lunch, something to look forward to at the noon hour break (or before, for extra hungry nibblers).

Focusing on sandwiches—the heart of the carried lunch—are these proven recipes furnished to us by Ellen Semrow, Director

on Consumer Service Dept. of Chicago. They give new ways with fillings, spreads, and bread . . . way to put sparkle in a luncher's eye. For inspiration, they call on bakers' breads and buns, available in varieties aplenty, and countless ingredients that combine for fillings. These can include meats and cheeses of many modes, spreads that are quick to prepare or purchase, and harvest fruits and vegetables—to sweeten or season, to add color and crunch.

Orange Slaw-Bologna Sandwich
 1 teaspoon lemon juice
 1 tablespoon evaporated milk
 1/2 teaspoon prepared horseradish
 1/2 teaspoon sugar
 1/8 teaspoon salt
 1 large orange, peeled, sectioned and diced (about 1/2 cup)
 1 cup chopped or shredded cab-

bage (medium fine)
 3 tablespoons soft butter or margarine
 4 sliced sandwich buns
 4 slices bologna
 Slowly stir lemon juice into milk. Blend in horseradish, sugar, salt and pepper. Drain juice from diced orange. Add cabbage and diced orange to dressing mixture. Butter both halves of buns. Place a slice of bologna and 1/3 cup slaw in each buttered bun.
YIELD: 4 Orange Slaw-Bologna Sandwiches.

Ham-Cottage Cheese Sandwich
 1/2 cup cottage cheese
 1/2 teaspoon minced onion
 1/2 teaspoon finely chopped green pepper
 3 tablespoons soft butter or margarine
 8 slices enriched or whole wheat bread
 4 slices boiled ham
 4 lettuce leaves
 Combine cottage cheese, onion and green pepper. Butter bread. Spread 2 tablespoons cheese mixture over 4 slices buttered bread. Place a slice of ham and a lettuce leaf over cottage cheese. Top with another slice of buttered bread. Yield: 4 Ham-Cottage cheese sandwiches.

Corned Beef-Onion Sandwich
 1 cup chopped, cooked corned beef
 1/2 cup chopped celery
 2 tablespoons chopped onion
 2 teaspoons prepared mustard
 1/4 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing
 1/4 cup soft butter or margarine
 10 slices rye bread
 Combine corned beef, celery, onion, mustard and mayonnaise. Butter bread. Spread 1/4 cup corned beef mixture over 5 slices buttered bread. Top with another slice of buttered bread. Yield: 5 corned beef-onion sandwiches.

Olive-American Cheese Sandwich
 3 tablespoons soft butter or margarine
 8 slices enriched bread
 filling
 1 cup olive butter or olive-nut filling
 4 slices process American cheese
 Butter bread. Spread 1/4 cup olive

Taylor is Named Red Hat Days Head

Ralph Taylor, Heppner, has been named by Governor Mark Hatfield as Morrow county chairman of this year's Red Hat Days activities.

Red Hat Days is an annual observance sponsored by a state-wide committee consisting of farm groups, timber operators, conservationists, livestock interests, labor organizations and state and federal agencies.

The year-long program is aimed at encouraging good outdoor manners among those who visit Oregon's forests, fields and streams. During the period from September through December, emphasis will be on promoting hunter safety, respect for public and private property, and eliminating forest and range fires.

In naming local committee chairman, Hatfield urged all citizens "to be conscious of the need for care in our grasslands and wooded areas, particularly during this season of abnormally high fire danger."

 8 slices rye bread

 4 slices Swiss cheese
 Spread mayonnaise on bread. Place sliced tongue on 4 slices of bread. Cover tongue with sliced Swiss Cheese and top with remaining bread slices. Yield: 4 Tongue-Swiss Cheese Sandwiches

Charles Hunt Gets FHA Appointment To Loan Committee

Charles L. Hunt has been appointed as a member of the FHA Area Committee for Grant, Morrow, and Umatilla Counties. He succeeds Mr. Henry P. Kopaec who has served his three-year term as committeeman.

Mr. Hunt operates a family-type farm near Stanfield.

Two other members make up the three-member committee, which works with the county supervisor to see that the best possible use is made of the agency's farm credit service program consistent with local farmers' needs. The other two members are John F. Walchi of Hermiston and Robert C. Smith of Irrigon.

The committee determines the eligibility of individual applicants for all types of loans. It also reviews borrowers' progress and aids the county supervisor in adapting the agency's loan policies to conditions faced by farmers in this area. Members are selected and appointed so that, so far as possible, differing areas or neighborhoods are represented.

The Farmers Home Administration makes annual or intermediate term loans to farmers who need adequate funds to buy equipment and livestock, and longer term loans to build or repair houses and other essential farm buildings, and to purchase or improve land suitable for family-type farm operations.

It also advances credit to farmers or their non-profit associations to establish and carry out approved soil and water conservation practices, and to install and improve irrigation and farmstead water facilities.

Livestock Loans Available Now

Special livestock loans are available to eligible livestock producers through December 31, 1961, according to Robert V. Pierce, Oregon state director of the Farmers Home Administration.

Special livestock loans are made to established producers and feeders of cattle, sheep, and goats (except commercial feed-lot operators) who are temporarily unable to get from regular sources the credit needed to continue their normal operations.

To be eligible an applicant must have a good past record of livestock operations and have reasonable prospects for success with the help of the loan.

Loans are made to meet the usual expenses of livestock operations such as the production or purchase of feed, and replacing or repairing of farm machinery. Farmers may also apply for loans to restock their herds or flocks to normal size if they can carry on their livestock operations without having to buy substantial amounts of feed. Loans are not made to pay existing debts except current incidental bills.

If a farmer already has his livestock mortgaged, the other creditors will not be asked to subordinate their liens. However,

they will be expected to stand by and to agree that a reasonable part of the applicant's normal income from the livestock can be used in repaying the loan.

Special livestock loans bear 5 per cent interest and are scheduled for repayment over periods up to three years.

Farmers may apply at the local county office of the Farmers Home Administration, 105 S. E. Byers Ave., Pendleton, Oregon.

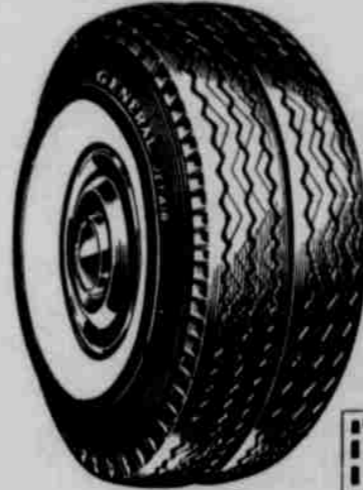
