

Riverside High, Boardman Grade Ready for School Start Sept. 5

BOARDMAN—Riverside high school and Boardman grade school will open for the 1961-62 year Tuesday, Sept. 5, and will be a full day of school. Buses will run on schedule and the cafeteria will be open for lunch. Handbooks are being mailed out to parents with schedules, states Ronald Daniels, superintendent, and any parent not receiving one may stop at the school office and obtain one. Registration will be held the first day of school.

The faculty members will attend a two day workshop at the school Aug. 31 and Sept. 1. The afternoon of Sept. 1 they will attend a workshop at Heppner.

New teachers this year include Ronald Daniels, superintendent, who will teach social problems and business law, and coach basketball. He comes from Harper, where he was superintendent. He received his B. A. and M. A. degrees at the College of Idaho at Caldwell, Idaho. He is married and has two daughters, Pamela, 3, and Vicki, three months.

Al Reeves will be music and band instructor for the four upper grades and the high school. He comes here from Pomeroy, Wash. He received his B. A. degree at Eastern Washington College at Cheney, Wash., and took his graduate work at Central Washington College at Ellensburg, Wash. He is married and has a three-year-old son named Sean.

Dan Daltoso will teach all social studies and coach football. He comes from Walla Walla, Wn., and is a graduate of the University of Portland. He has been coach at Harper the past two years. He recently was married in Butte, Mont., and his wife, Mary Lou will teach the second grade. She has taught the past three years in Butte.

Jim Harper will coach baseball, and will teach mathematics and boys physical education. He received his B. A. degree at the College of Idaho, and has taught the past five years at Adrian, Ore. He is married and has two children, a daughter in the eighth grade, and a son who will be in the first grade.

Other teachers returning this year are Ronald Black, vocational agriculture and shop; Lester Leroux, all sciences; Ruth Coy, commercial subjects and library, and English; Della Lindsay, home Economics and English; LaVerne Partlow, fifth and sixth grade, and girls physical education; Mildred Baker, third and fourth grade; Zoe Billings, first grade. The seventh and eighth grades will go to Irrigon, since with the separation of the first and second grades, a shortage of rooms occurred.

Cafeteria cooks will be Mrs. Nadean Brandt of Irrigon and Mrs. Delbert Carpenter. Robert Harwood will be custodian and will drive one school bus. Ed Skubso will be the other bus driver.

New Stamps of Interest
Mrs. Flossie Coats, postmaster, announces the sale of two new stamps at the local post office. The first one, a 4-cent marking the 50th anniversary of Naval Aviation, was placed on sale at the San Diego, Calif. post office Aug. 20, on the occasion of the meeting of the Institute of Aerospace Sciences. The stamp features an early naval airplane and the naval air insignia, and is based on a design by John Maass, a member of the Citizen's Stamp Advisory Committee. It will be blue in color.

The second stamp, also a 4-cent, will be issued through the Milwaukee, Wis. post office Sept. 4 to mark the 50th anniversary of the first successful workmen's compensation legislation. It will be blue on gray toned paper. The design is essentially abstract, seeking to communicate the ideal of Law—perfect justice. Exactly balanced on the scales are a man, his wife and child, and a factory, representing industry. The Wisconsin law sets a pattern for vital compensation laws passed subsequently throughout the country to provide protection for employees and their families in the event of accident and resulting disabilities.

The stamp will go on sale here Sept. 5.

Maple said that rodeo producer Eugene will present either two or three events for the show horses along with the regular championship rodeo events. Assisting Christensen will be Ward Wells of Beaverton and Charles Barclay of Salem.

Gene Sisler of Emmett, Idaho, will also appear at every performance with his Australian shepherd dogs. His three dogs perform a variety of tricks, combining an amazing canine intelligence with comedy.

Cowboy clown Wilbur Plaugher will entertain the fans, and at the same time will be performing the valuable service of rescuing cowboys thrown from Brahma bulls.

Rodeo events to be held include steer wrestling, calf roping, saddle bronc riding, bareback riding and bull riding. All money won at the Fair counts toward the Rodeo Cowboys Association's world championship award.

4-H Rifle Club Boys Place High, Compete In State

IONE—Three representatives from Morrow county's six 4-H Rifle clubs won themselves on Sunday, August 20, at the Lone Outdoor Rifle Range the right to represent Morrow county at the State Fair, in competitive shooting in Salem on Sept. 4.

Ione's two rifle clubs won all three positions as Bobby DeSpain of the Lone Safe Shooters Club took high honors for the day by placing first in the semi-finals and first in the finals. Tom Pointer of Lexington, representing the same club, placed second, with Jay Ball from the Ione Rifleman's Club placing third.

Four positions were used in shooting; prone, standing, kneeling and sitting.

DeSpain placed first in the semi-finals with a respectable 326 out of a possible 400 points.

The top six boys from the semi-finals competed against each other, with the top three scores being chosen for State Fair competition. The six competing were Bobby DeSpain; Tom Pointer, Lexington; Jay Ball, Ione; Calif. Irrigon; Moore of Boardman and Gene Wallace of Lexington.

DeSpain's high honors for the finals saw a total of 289 points, second place Pointer had 283, third place Ball with 261, for the top three places earning the right to go to State Fair.

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Girls To Compete For Miss Rodeo

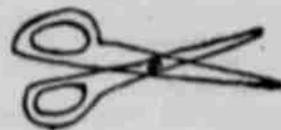
