

# North Morrow Fair Set for September 7

**Boardman**—The North Morrow Fair will start here Sept. 7 and last through Sept. 9. Thursday will be entry day, with all exhibits to be in place not later than 6 p. m., with the exception of cream pies in the cooked food division. They must be entered Thursday, but not be brought in until Friday for judging. All poultry and livestock must be entered Thursday. All feed will be furnished by the exhibitor. Judging of F.F.A. entries will start at 8 a. m., Friday. There will be entertainment at the grounds both Friday and Saturday. Saturday morning the parade will start at the school house at 10 o'clock, winding through the town to the fair grounds. Prizes will be given for the best floats. Theme of the floats is "Songs." There will also be a novelty prize.

Saturday afternoon there will be races for everyone on the race track at the grounds, and a bicycle parade.

### Improvements Noted At School Grounds

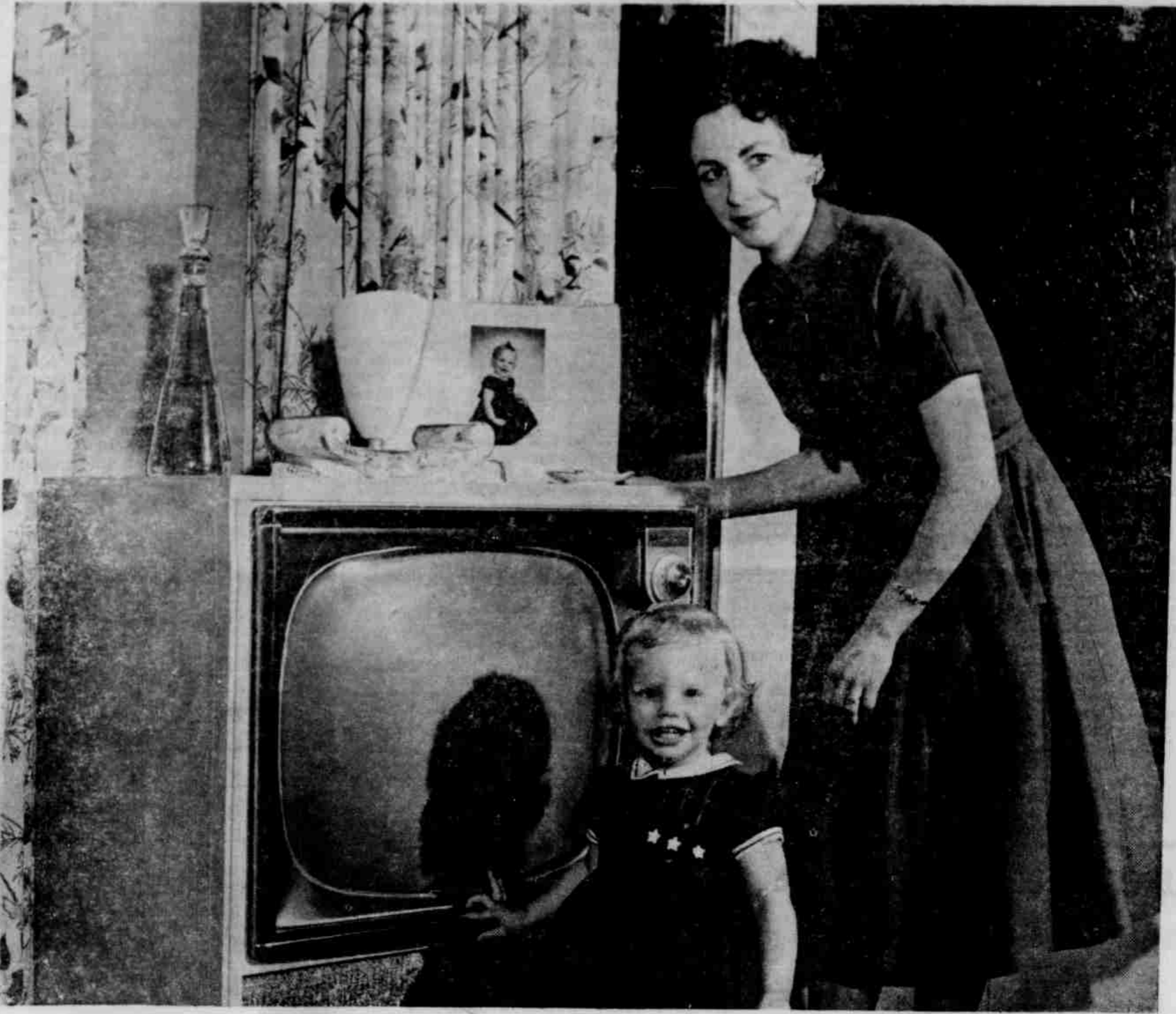
