He was proud of the fact that for 35 years he has done the murals for the World Championship Rodeo at Madison Square Garden in New York City.

At 57, this was his first trip into Oregon. He said he likes the state and plans to return.

During the winter he and his wife, also an artist, paint pictures of cowboys and western scenes on wood plaques, which they sell from their home at Wright City, Okla.

Next stop for Larson was to be Pendleton, where he will promote the Round-Up in his own inimitable way.

"I hope you have a good rodeo," he said. "I never see them, I'm always ahead of them and have seen only the big ones in New York at the Garden."
