Longer Pheasant Season Set

A one week longer cock pheasant season and an early opener for chukar shooting are the major changes from last year contained in the 1961 upland game bird regulations set recently by the game commission following a public hearing.

The commission again allowed a liberal pheasant hunt after noting the pheasant population similar to last year. The season will open at 8 a. m., October 14 and extend through November 19. Bag limit will remain the same as last year, 3 cocks daily, 12 in possession.

Chukar hunters were given a split season. A September 9 through 17 early opener was adopted to allow chukar hunters an opportunity to take these birds before they dispersed later in the season, in addition to the regular upland bird season, October 14 through November 19.
