

## Cards Show Strength In Thumping Culver 11

Ione's 8-man football team displayed some of the power and skill that characterized last year's state champion team when they overran Culver, 35 to 21, on the Ione field Friday afternoon.

A first quarter touchdown with Ken Nelson, halfback, going over from six yards out set the pace for the winners. Wayne Hams, veteran quarterback, ran the extra point, and the Cards took a 7-point lead.

The Cards added two more in the second quarter, but the visitors also hit paydirt to bring the halftime count to 21-7. For Ione, Ken Klingler tallied from the two, and Nelson scored the extra point. Hams broke away for a 48-yard run to bring the other Ione touchdown for the period and Klingler added the point.

Bob MacRostie drew first blood for Culver when he pitched a pass to Jack Burke that brought a touchdown from the 8-yard line. MacRostie kicked the point.

Ione still had speed and power to display. Hams took off in the third quarter on a 40-yard gallop for another score and frosted the cake by running the conversion point.

Culver's MacRostie kept his team in the ball game with another touchdown-producing run, and pitched a pass to Burke for the extra point.

In the fourth stanza, Hams made his third long touchdown run, this one good for 25 yards. He passed for the extra point to Ron Crabtree.

The Burke-MacRostie combination was good for another aerial touchdown for Culver, this one reaching paydirt in the fourth quarter. MacRostie added the point, and kept the conversion record perfect for both clubs.

Coach Glenn Biehl had good words to say about his ball club after the game. Ron Crabtree was credited with doing a fine defensive job, having made 10 tackles and three assists in the contest. Les Madden was equally fine on defense, making seven tackles, three assists and recovering two fumbles.

Hams, in addition to scoring the touchdowns, completed four of five passes and racked up 144 yards running. Nelson averaged 7½ yards per carry in the

game, going 74 yards on seven tries.

For Ione, everyone on the squad played at least two quarters.

"Heppner is inexperienced and many mistakes were made that definitely hurt us," the coach said.
