Collision Hospitalizes Four
Four Boardman residents were hospitalized with serious injuries Thursday night of last week following an accident in which two cars collided at the crossroads of Wilson Road and Paul Smith road on the Boardman project about a mile south of town.

Taken to the Good Shepherd hospital in Hermiston were Emile Ash, about 76, driver of one car, with serious head injuries, and his wife Lena, 70, with a badly injured knee. Driver of the other car was Mrs. Everett (Alice) Daniels, 37, who received chest bruises, hip injuries and a broken pelvic bone. Her mother, Mrs. Myron Watts, 57, received seven broken ribs, a cut elbow and head gash, and was treated for shock.

The Ash car was traveling east on Wilson Road, and Mrs. Daniels was going south on the Smith Road, both arriving at the crossroad at the same time. The accident occurred about 6:15 p. m., and visibility was poor due to the time of day and to weeds along the road. After the cars collided the Daniels car went on to crash against a tree stump at the side of the road. The car was demolished, and the Ash car was damaged less extensively.

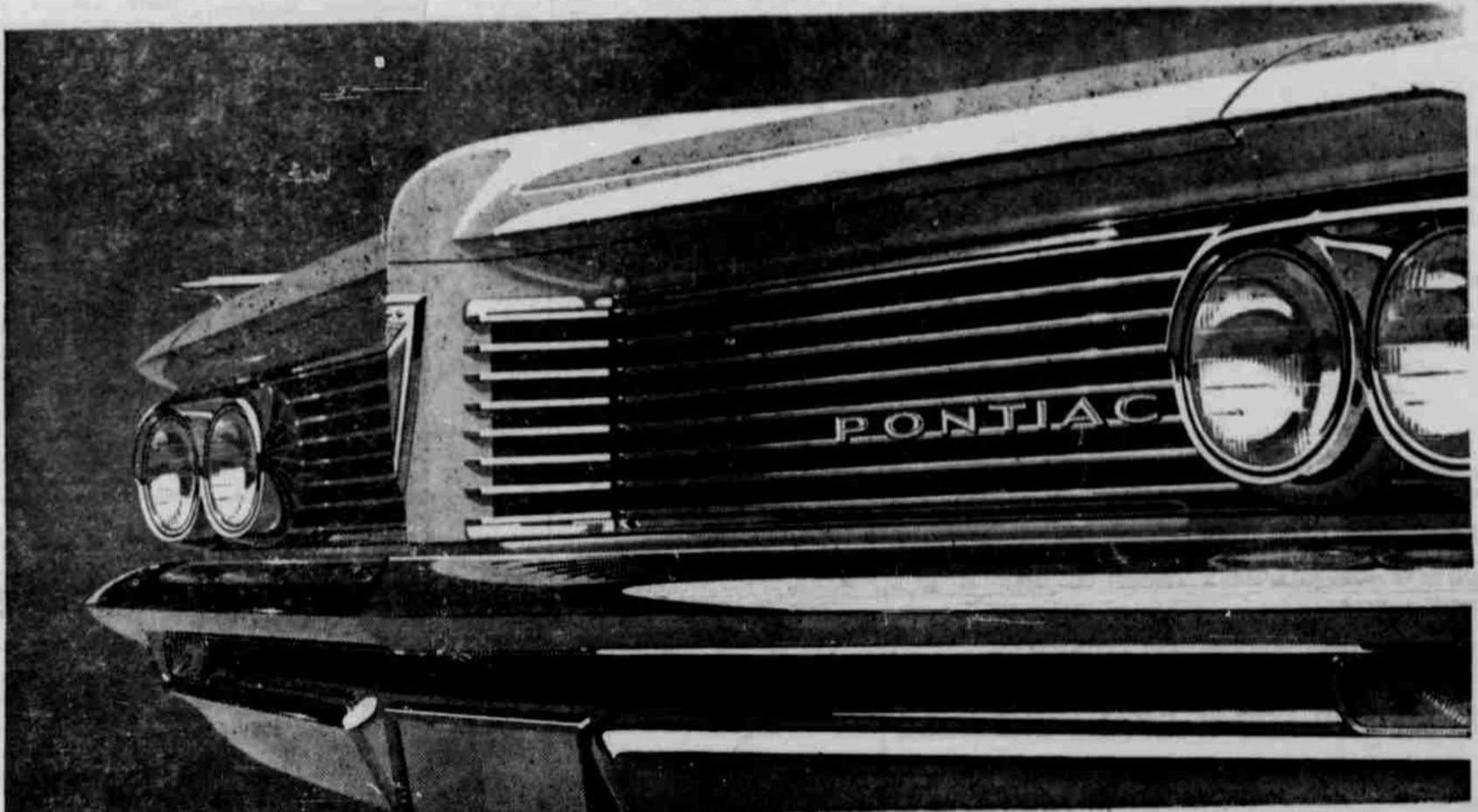
