

Laura Allen Services Held in Boardman

BOARDMAN—Funeral services were held here last Friday at 2 p. m. for Laura A. Allen, 83, who died Sept. 19 about 4 p. m. on the way to the hospital following a heart attack. She was pronounced dead on arrival at the Good Shepherd hospital in Hermiston. Services were held at the Boardman Community church with Rev. Rol Burg, church pastor, in charge. Burial was in Riverview cemetery. Pallbearers were Elmer Messenger, Ray Brown, Roy Ball, Harold Rash, S. C. Russell and Royal Rands. Mrs. Lowell Shattuck and Mrs. Nathan Thorpe sang "Face to Face" and "Good-night and Good-morning," accompanied by Mrs. Claud Coats. Burns Mortuary was in charge of arrangements.

Laura Ann Allen was born Dec. 14, 1877 in Missouri, the daughter of Alexander and Martha Kelly. When a small child the family moved to Nebraska, where she lived until after she was married to Jesse M. Allen August 15, 1900. He preceded her in death in Feb. 1955. They moved to Boardman in 1921 and lived here since except for about four years in the early 1940's, when they lived in Portland, returning here in 1945.

Mrs. Allen is survived by a son Arthur A. Allen, and a daughter, Mrs. Willard (Mildred) Baker, of Boardman; brothers Will Kelly of Los Angeles, Calif. and John Kelly of Bristow, Nebraska; sisters Minnie Ashcraft of Tilden, Nebr., Sylvia Olds of Omaha, Nebr., Vesta Nyrop of Columbus, Ohio, and Mary Nott of Portland; four grandchildren and four great-grandchildren. Relatives here from out of town for the funeral included Mr. and Mrs. Clayton Allen and children Cami and Bobbie of Granger, Wash., Gene Allen of Seattle, Wash., and Mrs. Mary Nott of Portland.

The color of the stamp will be gradations of blue, red and yellow. It will be on sale here Oct. 5.

The second stamp, also a 4-cent, will be issued through the Washington, D. C. office, Oct. 10, recognizing the 50th anniversary of the founding of the

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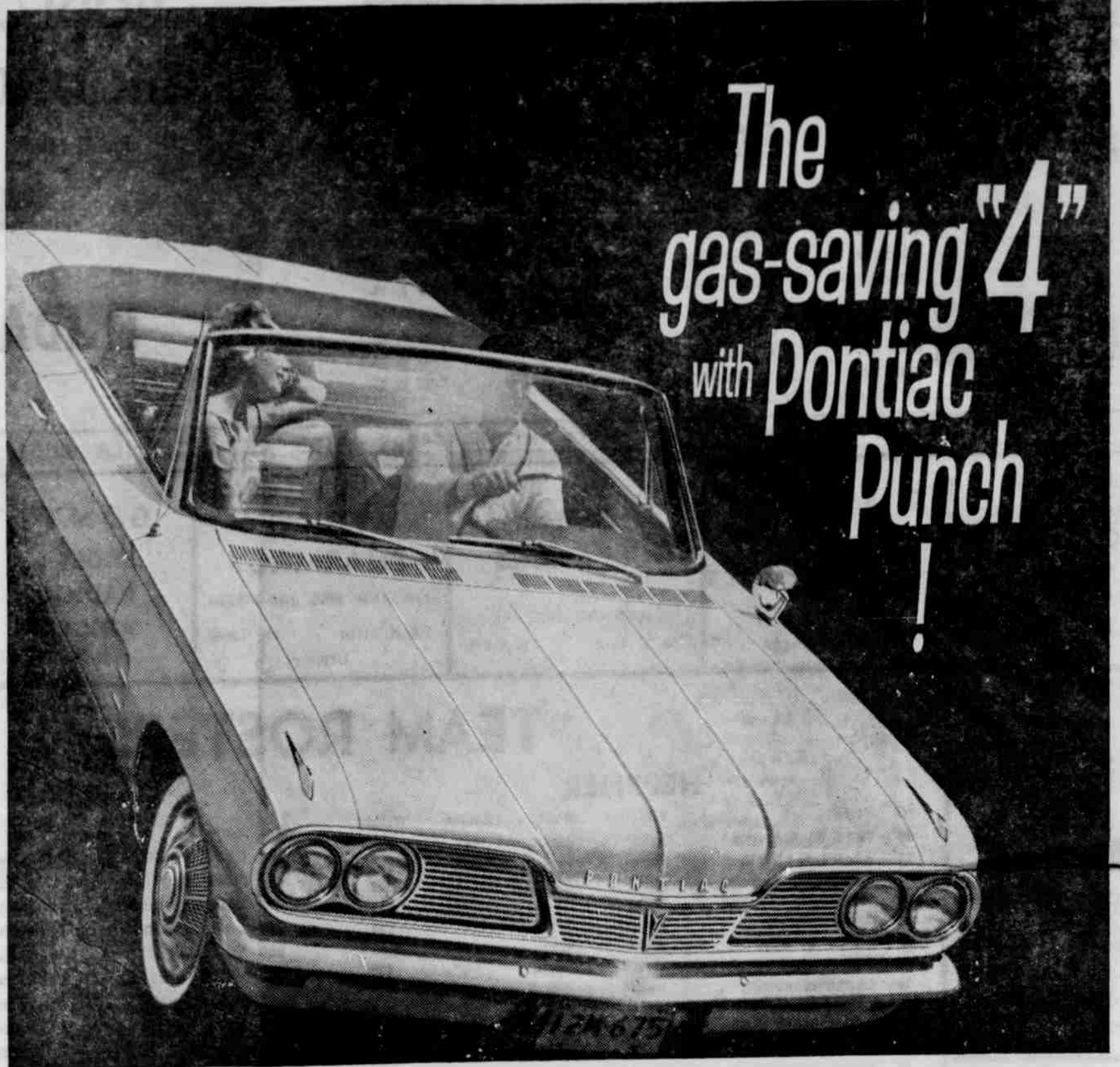
