The present observer was born just out of Heppner and has been here all of his life. His wife died a number of years ago and he lives with his sister, Ona Gilliam, and an unmarried son, Donald Gilliam, who is a clerk in the post office. Another son is Louis of Condon, who is married and has four children, three daughters and a son.

Leonard admitted that keeping the weather records is "something of a nuisance" and does keep him pretty well "tied down," although his son and his sister help out when he can't be on hand.

The charts were made, he declares, in "self-defense" because some individual or organization was always coming to check his records. By compiling it all on the charts, it is very easy to find and read without bothering the permanent records.

He chose the daily time of 9 a. m. to check the instruments because he wouldn't have to get up so early in the morning, and he candidly declares that he has very seldom missed his daily

appointment with the silent sentinel.

"Oh, maybe a few times I have fudged just a little," he confessed, "but not very often."

Someone is "always" calling for information on the weather.

"One party was after me all the time," he declared. "Finally I asked them, 'Don't you take the Heppner paper?' They said they did. I told them that they could read the report in there every week. So they didn't call me any more after that."

But the fact remains that if you want to know how much it rained on the day of the family reunion in June, 1927, or July, 1936, or whenever it happened to be, Gilliam can tell you.
