Debits for August, 1961, totaled \$41,153,779. For July, 1961, the total was \$36,936,959, and for August, 1960, the total was \$47,832,136.

Oregon, with 230 banks reporting, had an increase in bank debits in August, 1961, of 10 percent, compared with July, 1961, and a decrease of 1.9 percent from August, 1960.

Total debits for Oregon in August, 1961, came to \$2,215,401,357. For July, 1961, the total was \$2,012,377,699, and for August, 1960, the total was \$2,259,220,380.

## Bank Debits Down In Pendleton Area

Bank debits for the Pendleton area, including Morrow and Umatilla counties, decreased in August, 1961, compared to August, 1960, according to the University of Oregon Bureau of Business Research.

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
