Interim Committee Set To Study Local Budget Law

The Legislative interim committee on local government has announced the appointment of 16 members to an advisory committee to study the revision of Oregon's "local budget law." The appointments are the result of a two-day hearing by the committee in Eugene early in September at which public officials from cities, counties, school and special districts appeared before the interim committee urging complete revision of the local budget law. The law, which was originally passed in 1921, was described as "archaic" and "badly in need of revision" at the hearing.

Representative Edward J. Whelan, D. Portland, chairman of the interim committee, named George Baldwin, comptroller for the Portland public school system, chairman of the advisory committee. Other members appointed are from cities and county officials, school boards, and other interested branches of government.

Announcement of the advisory committee's first meeting will be made shortly, according to Whelan.
