HERE IS a recipe we used in an extension meeting last fall which went over real well and our family really enjoys it: This is made in one pan, a main dish especially convenient for hunters or a quick at home meal.

HUNTER'S GULLION
Cut 5 strips bacon into small pieces and fry in a 2-quart pan until partially done.

Add: 1 pkg. Lipton's onion soup or
1 large onion, chopped, and cook until onion is wilted.
1 lb. ground beef and brown until crumbly.
2 no. 303 cans tomato soup (undiluted), season to taste
1 cup boiled diced potatoes
1/2 cup cooked diced carrots
Cook for 15 minutes stirring occasionally. Cut 1/4 lb. American cheese into 1/2 inch cubes, stir in. Heat until cheese melts. Spoon over split toasted hamburger buns.
