

Bufs Thump Mustangs, 35-0, on Madras Grid

Madras' state-rated White Buffalos crushed Heppner high on the Madras football field, 35 to 0, Friday night.

The Mustangs, who had come through with a 14-0 win over John Day a week earlier, met a strong, big and experienced team in the Buffs. They played on even terms for the first quarter, but in the second, Henry Plummer broke loose for the first of two touchdowns of that period, a 19-yard run. Tom Clark kicked the first of four conversions.

Heppner, showing considerable improvement after a slow start

this year, knuckled down once more, but Madras connected on a 23-yard pass with 10 seconds to go in the quarter for the second tally. The conversion point was good, and halftime had the winners ahead, 14-0.

The Buffs put together another drive in the third quarter and scored again with Plummer going over from 25 yards out. Again the conversion was good, making the score 21-0 at the end of the period.

Size of the Buffalos told in the fourth quarter. The Madras eleven rolled for two more touchdowns and two conversions for the final 35-0 outcome.

"I think they are one of the strongest teams we have met all season," Coach Jim Sutherland of the Mustangs said. "They are well-balanced and big. They had good depth, and we could not cope with this. I am disappointed in not making a better showing, but considering the strength of Madras, I believe that we did all right."

Heppner ended the game with several minor injuries.

The win for Madras gave the Buffs first place in the Greater Oregon league with two straight victories. Heppner now has a 1-1 mark in the circuit.

Another tough one is coming for Heppner Friday when they go to Condon for an afternoon game there.

"We have a difficult one Friday at Condon but we could win if luck is on our side," the coach said. Burns is on tap for October 21 at Burns, and the Mustangs come home for their finale against Moro here on October 27.

Cardinals Romp, 47-6; Face Big Test on Friday

Ione's high-flying 8-man football team continued its victory string Friday by topping Helix, 47-6, in a Umatilla-Morrow League contest. This was the fourth straight for Coach Glenn Biehl's Jads.

The Cardinals tallied in every quarter, going in front in the first period by a score of 21-0. They had rolled it up to 27-0 by halftime, but the Helix club came back with a touchdown in the third quarter while the Cards made a touchdown and a safety. Thus, going into the final quarter, it was 35 to 6, and then the winners finished with two more touchdowns in the last period.

This was the last game for the Cards at home this year and their final contest before taking on the St. Joseph team at Pendleton in the big battle of the season Friday afternoon. St. Joseph is also undefeated, and outcome of this game probably will decide the league championship.

First blood against Helix came when Quarterback Wayne Hams scored on a keeper play that was good for 60 yards and a touchdown. Ken Klinger ran the extra point.

Just a short time later, Klinger skirted end for 20 yards and scored again. The conversion point by Hams was good.

The third touchdown was a spectacular one. Klinger took a punt and appeared trapped on the return. He was hit but rolled off and ran 70 yards to the end zone. Hams kicked the point.

In the second quarter Hams romped 45 yards on an end run and was helped by several fine blocks as he brought six more points to the Cards' total. The point try was no good.

Teenage Hunters Must Have Gun Safety Training

Oregon teenage hunters have only three months before the new law becomes effective requiring them to have a certificate of competency in safe handling of firearms, reminds Andy Landforce, OSU extension wildlife management specialist.

The increasingly popular 4-H Gun Safety project is one way for young hunters to get their certificates, he points out. The other way is through classes taught by the Oregon State Game Commission.

More than 400 Oregon teenagers (61 of them girls) were enrolled in the 4-H gun safety project last year. Although Landforce expects this number to double during the coming year, he points out that the potential number runs into the thousands. Each year, about 30,000 Oregonians under age 17 buy hunting licenses.

After January 1, 1962, these young hunters will have to earn their certificates of competency in safe handling of firearms before they can get their hunting licenses.

The 4-H Gun Safety project is divided into five phases: 4-H Safe Shooter, 4-H Marksman, 4-H Sharpshooter, 4-H Expert Rifleman, and 4-H Hunter. The first phase, the 4-H Safe Shooter, includes the Oregon Hunter Safety Training Program. Those who complete this project automatically receive their certificates of competency, which enable them to purchase their hunting licenses, it was noted.

County Agent, Joe Hay stated that 54 boys were enrolled in the 4-H Gun Safety project this year in Morrow county. This year he expects this number to more than double. If this increase in 4-H club members is to be attained, more volunteer leaders will be needed. At least one 4-H leader is needed for each 8 to 10 4-H club members. Anyone interested in leading a 4-H Gun Safety club, please contact the County Agent's office within the next two weeks.

Boys and girls who want to get their hunting license in 1962 and who are interested in enrolling in a 4-H Gun safety project should leave their name and address at the County Agent's office sometime during the month of October he said.

It's time to elect new officers in Willow Creek club. Get your thinking caps on and back the man of your choice.

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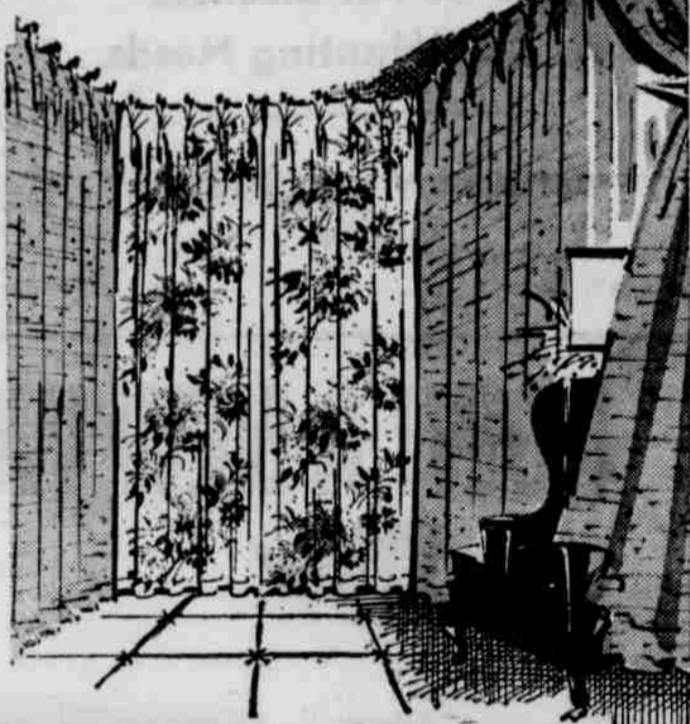
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
