1 green pepper sliced
Dressing:
3/4 cup sugar
1 t salt
1/2 cup vinegar
1/2 cup salad oil
1 T pepper, mixed to own desire using cayenne and black pepper

Mix well and let stand in refrigerator for several hours or overnight.
