## Burns 11 Downs Heppner, 32-0, On Muddy Grid

Heppner's Mustangs were as cold as the chilly afternoon when they lost a 32-0 football game to Burns High on the latter's muddy field Friday afternoon.

The Mustangs never threatened to score in the contest.

The winners tallied quickly when Altnow ran 50 yards to a touchdown and Waterman ran the conversion point. A pass, Madreita from Mosley, brought the second score in the first quarter, which ended 13-0.

In the second quarter the Mustangs held, but they could not muster an offensive drive, and halftime ended with Burns leading, 13-0.

After intermission, Burns came back strong for 13 more points. Johnston ran 11 yards for one touchdown and galloped 15 for his team's fourth touchdown. Conversion was made after the third tally on a pass from Madreita to Mosley. The quarter ended with Burns in front, 26 to 0.

Final touchdown of the contest came in the fourth quarter when Waterman ran five yards. The extra point try failed.

Fumbles played a big part in halting the Heppner offense, Coach Jim Sutherland said after the game.

The home team finishes the season at homecoming here Friday night when they play Sherman county (Moro).

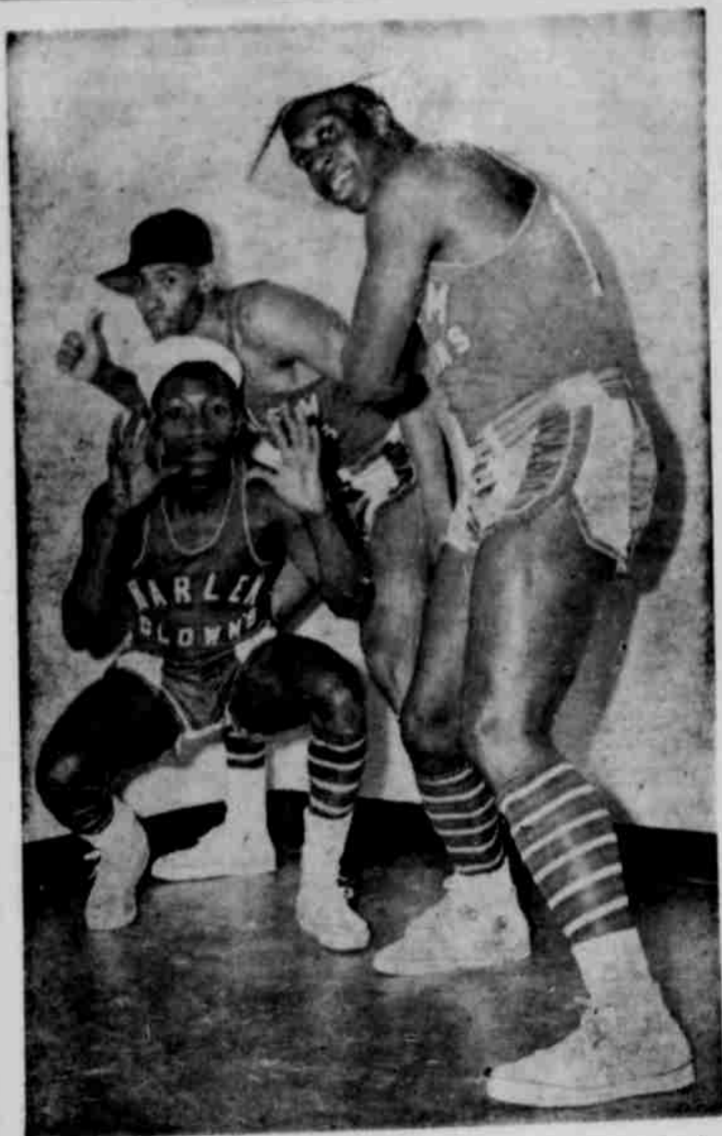
