3 Long Moro Runs Defeat Stubborn Mustangs, 19-0

That ancient football ailment, "fumblyitis," struck Heppner High's Mustangs in their final game of the season Friday night and they lost the Homecoming contest with Sherman county (Moro), 19 to 0.

However, in losing the Heppner team played a fine defensive game and showed a fighting spirit all the way. Except for three long runs, each of which resulted in touchdowns for the visitors, Coach Jim Sutherland's club played the heavy Moro eleven to a standoff.

First Moro score came quickly when Bill Doolin broke away and raced 53 yards to the end zone. Late comers to the game missed this tally, and saw the two teams battle in midfield through most of the first half, which ended 6 to 0 for Moro.

Ken Maynard squirmed through in the third period and went 22 yards to score, and the final Moro touchdown was in the last quarter when John Kelly romped 57 yards. Jack Kellogg made the only extra point of the game when he kicked the conversion after the third touchdown.

"The Heppner Mustangs played fine defensive ball," Coach Sutherland said after the game. "It was the last game for Seniors Archie Ball, Bruce Moyer, Eddie Howard, Merlin Hughes, Ladd Dick, Mike Healy and Joel Yackley. All of these boys did a good job this year. They will be missed."

"The coach said that he was pleased with the season although the team won only one game. "I think the boys were winners in other ways. I am very proud of them. I think this last game showed that they enjoyed football and they played this last game well."

Ione Blasts Wishram In 8-Man Brawl 68-0

In a game that turned into a wild brawl before the end, Ione High school's 8-man football team shellacked Wishram, Wn., there Saturday, 68-0.

Three of the Wishram team were ejected from the game as tempers flared. The Cardinals went the route without losing a man, but Coach Glenn Biehl said later, "We came out with some aches and pains."

Aside from the flistic encounters, Ione carved out an easy victory. The Cards first touchdown came on their first play from scrimmage when Quarterback Wayne Hams shot a 5-yard pass to Ron Crabtree who rammed 85 yards to score.

Later in the opening period, Hams went 60 yards himself to add a second touchdown.

Four more and a safety came swiftly in the second quarter. Hams fired a pass to Crabtree in the end zone for one. Hams ran 28 yards for a second one. Ken Klinger galloped 48 yards for the third, and Lee Hams, playing for the ailing Ken Nelson, took a pass from brother Wayne for 10 yards and ran another 10 to score. The safety went up on the score board when Les Madden tackled a Wishram ball packer in the end zone.

Score at halftime favored Ione, 41 to 0.

In the third period, Klinger scored twice on touchdown runs of 42 and 60 yards. In the fourth, Wayne Hams did the honors, running 30 yards for one and eight for another.

Six of 10 extra point tries were made in the game. Quarterback Hams went through the line for two. Crabtree tallied on a pass from Hams, and Joe Palmer, center, went into the backfield to run another point. Bob DeSpain got into the scoring act when he also ran a point, and Les Madden, a guard, added the final one on a run.

Coach Biehl said that Jerry Davidson was outstanding on defense and Madden as middle line backer did an excellent job. Klinger and Wayne Hams were also tops on offense.

This was the final game for Ione before the state quarter-final playoff with Mt. Vernon on the neutral John Day field Saturday, November 11.

New Photography Project Readied For 4-H Members

A new 4-H photography project, which allows each boy or girl to progress at his own speed and which broadens the scope of activity, has been unveiled for use this year in Oregon.

The new project and advancement program was developed by a committee of Oregon 4-H club leaders and agents and replaces the two photography projects in use since 1957, according to Dwight W. Fairbanks, visual instruction specialist at Oregon State University.

The new photography outline provides five steps for the 4-H club member to follow. The first is "shutterbugs," an introduction to the camera. The second is "camera hounds," which provides further experience in taking pictures with a simple camera.

The third step, 4-H junior photographer, carries the member to the "adjustable" camera stage and flash photography. In the fourth area, 4-H senior photographer, the club member can take his pick of learning about a darkroom and its processes color photography, motion pictures or advanced black and white photography.

In the final phase of the program, 4-H master photographer, the 4-H'er can carry out special projects selected by him with the approval of the club leader and 4-H club agent.

The new project and advancement program is on "field test" in the state this year, Fairbanks explained. Plans call for it to be ready in final form for the 1962-63 club year.
