Twenty-four Future Farmer of America club members from the district also participated in soil judging at the meet as preparatory work for a district FFA soil judging contest which will be held soon.

Pupils, Advisors To Attend State TB Press Meet

The journalism classes of all the high schools in Morrow county will participate in the Oregon state-wide press conference on "Assignment TB" scheduled for Saturday, November 4, in Portland.

This is the 25th year the National Tuberculosis association and the Columbia Scholastic Press association co-sponsor the silver anniversary school press project.

Included in the more than 600 students and their advisors who have pre-registered for the conference are approximately 40 Morrow county students who with their advisors, Mrs. Roy Kirk, Heppner high school; Mrs. Ruth Coy, Riverside high school and Gilbert Lujan, lone high school, plan to make the trip.

Students will hear Dr. James T. Spores, Dr. Georgia Lee and Richard E. Hatchard speaking on tuberculosis, health careers, and air pollution at a general session held Saturday morning at Portland State College. This will be followed by a panel discussion presented by the editorial and news staff of the Oregonian, and during the complimentary luncheon there will be opportunities for interviews with top personnel in health, science and social welfare fields.

Elk are Elusive To Hunters Here

Less elk were bagged in the first week of the season than had been anticipated in the Heppner hunting unit, according to officer James McPherson of State Police.

He said elk are in the mountains and in more numbers than last year when about 300 were taken out of the Heppner unit but they are elusive and hiding out.

"A good storm, or more hunters, would change the picture completely," McPherson reported Thursday (today). He said there are not nearly the number of hunters in the area as in previous years, so elk are not being forced to move around. A storm would drive them out of the higher elevations where they would more easily be spotted.

Road conditions are still good, though no one should go into the mountains without carrying chains, McPherson advised. Some snow fell recently with the Forest Service reporting ten inches of fresh snow last Saturday in the northeast end of the Heppner district.

Floyd Hutchens, city police officer, said hunters are snowed out of the Tolgate area. He made a trip there Saturday on his vacation but could not hunt and had to come home.

She is survived by her child-

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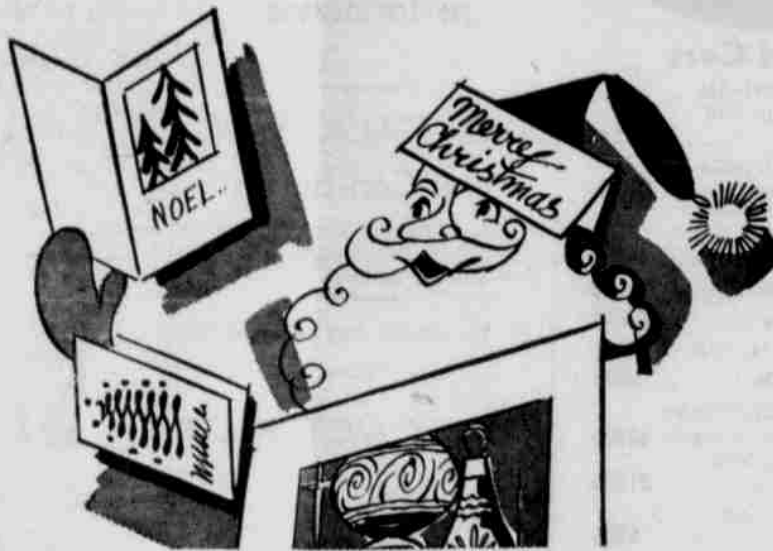
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
