## Family Life Authority Has Busy Time

Last week was "Roberta Fraiser" week in Morrow county. This nationally recognized authority on Family Life from Oregon State University spent a very full two days, October 24-25. (1) She trained extension unit project leaders for their November lesson; (2) "Understanding Teenagers;" (3) She met with a steering committee on the evening of October 24 to lay plans for a short course in the county this winter on "Understanding Boys and Girls;" (4) she counseled privately with a few people; and (5) visited with the county agents on how to promote this field of better family living. She went on to Umatilla county and I'm sure she went through the same routine.

"The Teen-age years have been talked about, written about

and studied about as much as any other period in the life of man." Mrs. Fraiser told the training group at Pine City school. "The teen-ager" has been criticized and condemned, but seldom publicly praised. He's had an extremely bad press, so that the public image built up has been that of an irresponsible individual."

Adults tend to look at him in the "here and now" without looking back at the child he has been or ahead to the adult he will become. The older generation acts as if he had grown up in a vacuum and came forth at age 13 to upset an otherwise stable world.

Understanding teen-agers is such a complex subject that we can only focus on three phases of it in the November project for all the women's groups: 1. Who are the teen-agers? 2. What ad-

justments do they face? 3. How can we live more comfortably with them?
