

6-County Council Set to Consider Survey Contract

Judge Oscar Peterson announced that the executive committee of the Mid Columbia Planning Council will hold a luncheon meeting in conjunction with the annual meeting of the Association of Oregon County Officials in Portland, November 14. Plans were laid for the luncheon at a meeting in Arlington last Monday of the executive committee.

The judge said the contract with Ebasco Services Inc. for a survey of the six counties and plans for future developments is ready to be signed. Also the agreement with the State Department of Planning and Development is ready for signing. The latter agreement makes it possible for the state department to obtain matching funds on a two-to-one basis from the federal government to pool with money put in by the counties and ports to finance the study by Ebasco.

It is hoped that both contracts will be signed at the November 14 meeting, the judge reported.

The Mid Columbia Planning Council, first organized in May, 1960, is composed of the courts, port commissions and planning commissions of six counties that front on the Columbia River—Hood River, Wasco, Sherman, Gilliam, Morrow and Umatilla. Judge Peterson is chairman of the group.

Perhaps you are wondering why some people use the term "agatized" wood? The latter term applies to all wood that has changed to stone; but if we want to be more technical, we use the name that identifies the composition of the stone that has replaced the wood. For instance, if the stone is of agate, which is very hard and takes a high polish, it would be called "agatized;" or the stone may have a composition referred to as being pyritized, or it might be carbonized, silicified, or calcified. Those beautiful petrified wood bookends which are so often seen in souvenir and gift shops are often made of agatized or jasperized wood.

Well, it's time to leave the woods of Arizona and come back to the basalt of Oregon. Hear there's to be a rock auction at our November 25th meeting, so hope you'll be with us then at the Old City Library—our armless chairs take us to the most interesting places—and we even have dessert along the way.

Mr. Bergstrom is a certified instructor under the state game commission.

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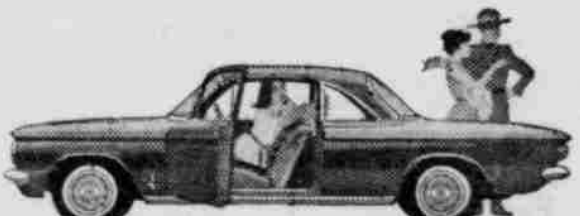
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
