The stamp will be the first placed on sale at Springfield, Mass., the site of the future Basketball Hall of Fame. The design features an upstretched hand, a basketball and a net, and will be brown in color. It goes on sale here Nov. 7. The department will issue an

8-cent regular stamp portraying General of the Armies, John J. Pershing, Nov. 17 through the New York, N. Y. post office. This stamp will ultimately replace the 8-cent Statue of Liberty design, which now appears also on the 3-cent and 11-cent regular denominations. Khaki in color, it pictures General Pershing in full uniform with four stars on the shoulder. Though permitted to wear five stars, he never wore more than four. The stamp goes on sale here Nov. 18.
