**LEBKUCHER (FRUIT BARS)**  
1 cup finely chopped walnuts  
1/2 cup mixed glazed fruit  
1 t. grated lemon rind  
2 cups sifted flour  
1/2 t. each: soda, salt, cloves, nutmeg  
1 t. cinnamon  
1/2 cup butter or shortening  
1/2 cup dark brown sugar, firmly packed  
1 egg  
1/3 cup molasses  
1/2 cup strong coffee  
Heat oven to 375 degrees, grease a 15x10 cookie sheet. Mix first three ingredients together, sift flour, soda, and spices together over fruit-walnut mixture, stir well. Cream butter and brown sugar till fluffy, blending well. Add flour-fruit mixture alternately with coffee, mixing well. Spread in pan, bake about 15 minutes. Frost with tinted glaze made of powdered sugar and water. Cut into 2 inch bars.

**HOLIDAY CAKE (fruit cake)**  
2 cups sifted flour  
1 t. soda  
1/2 t. salt  
1/2 t. cinnamon  
1/4 t. cloves  
1 cup raisins  
1 cup mixed candied fruit  
1 cup coarsely chopped nuts  
1/2 cup butter or margarine  
1 cup sugar  
1 egg  
1 t. vanilla  
1 1/2 cup applesauce  
Sift together flour, soda, salt, and spices. Combine 1/2 cup of this with fruits and nuts. Cream butter and sugar, stir in egg, vanilla and applesauce. Add dry ingredients gradually, mixing well. Stir in fruit and nuts. Pour into a greased angel food cake pan or 2 loaf pans. Bake in a slow oven (325 degrees) for 1 1/2 hours. Cool thoroughly.
