I HEARD several say they made the fruit cake from the column last week and this week I have uncooked fruit cake recipe which I got from Mrs. Dee Jones. Marilyn served it to us about two years ago and I have wanted to try it myself. It is very good and so easy to make!

No-Bake Festive Fruit Cake
Put into a bowl and let stand until needed:
1/2 c evaporated milk
16 large or 80 small marshmallows. If large marshmallows, must be finely cut.
Put into a large bowl:
4 doz. 2 1/2" graham crackers rolled into fine crumbs
1/4 t cinnamon
1/4 t nutmeg
1/8 t cloves
1/2 c dates, finely cut
1 c raisins
3/4 c walnuts, broken
1/3 c candied pineapple, finely cut
1/3 c candied cherries, finely cut
2 T candied orange peel, finely cut
Add milk mixture, mix with spoon, continue mixing with hands until all crumbs are moistened. Line with waxed paper, a 5-cup loaf or tube pan, and press mixture firmly into place. Decorate top with additional nuts and fruits, cover tightly and chill for two days before slicing. Keep refrigerated. Makes one 2 1/2 lb. cake.
